

PUBLIC LECTURE IN MACROOM



Aodh argued against the abolition of town councils and criticised many aspects of the *Putting People First* policy document and the Local Government Bill 2013. The event was jointly organised by the Lee Valley Enterprise Board and Macroom Town Council.






Guest Lecture by Dr Julie Yu-Wen Chen in Nottingham


When the West meets the East


THE INTERNET AT 40



On Friday 1 November, **Dr Theresa Reidy** took part in a very interesting symposium in UCC on 'The Internet at 40'. It followed two lectures by Professor John Naughton (above left) which he had given the previous day on the topic. John's lectures developed themes from earlier lectures such as this one from March on 'Our Networked Future.' He also drew on his recent book *From Gutenberg to Zuckerberg: What You Really Need to Know About the Internet.*

The symposium was chaired by Professor Cormac Sreenan, and panellists were Karlin Lillington, Theresa Reidy, Alfred Moore and Darius Whelan. There were really insightful contributions from the audience as well. It was organised by Ionad Bairre and Bettie Higgs, the Interim Vice President for Teaching and Learning.

In her contribution, Theresa argued that social media has had a transformative effect on politics, but we need more research on its effects. Can it be a force for citizen engagement? Can it challenge the dominance of elites? Twitter, she claimed, has transformed the dynamic of politics, with the possibility of public two-way conversations between politicians and voters.

UCC International Relations Society: National Model United Nations 2013

The UCC International Relations Society will host the National Model United Nations Conference in November. Under the auspices of Convenor **Jack Corbett (BSc Government II)**, the conference will see second-level students competing over a weekend as 'countries' on United Nations style committees, including the Security Council and DISEC. The event also encompasses an International Criminal Court simulation.

Last year's event attracted over 200 delegates from across Ireland. In a major coup for the Society, NatMUN this year will be opened and closed by two high-profile guest speakers, who will address public lectures which UCC staff and students are invited to attend.

The Conference will be opened on Friday 8 November by Professor Brian Burdekin. Advisor to three United Nations High Commissioners for Human Rights and a world authority on Human Rights Institutions, Professor Burdekin is currently the advisor to a number of National Human Rights Institutions across Africa, the Asia-Pacific, Europe and Latin America. His presentation will take place in the Western Gateway Building G05 at 16:00.

Lieutenant General Pat Nash, recently retired, has over 40 years experience of service with the Irish Defence Forces both at home and abroad. He was recently awarded France's prestigious *Légion d'Honneur* in recognition of his achievement as Operational Commander for the successful EU peacekeeping mission to Chad and the Central African Republic. Prior to this, he has had a wide range of overseas experience with United Nations Forces in Cyprus, the Lebanon, and the Western Balkans. He will close NatMUN in Boole 3 at 15:00 on Sunday 10 November.



The world renowned Professor Brian Burdekin will open the National Model United Nations 2013 with a talk on Friday 8 November. The previous afternoon, Thursday 7 November, Professor Burdekin will deliver a public lecture entitled 'National Human Rights Commissions: Giving Teeth to International Treaties' at 3:00pm in Western Gateway Room 3:04. This lecture is jointly hosted by the Department of Government and the Centre for Criminal Justice and Human Rights (Law Faculty). ALL WELCOME.
