SCHOOL OF PUBLIC HEALTH LAUNCH

UCC recently launched a new School of Public Health, which seeks to improve the health of the population through the discovery, dissemination, and translation of knowledge about health, and the prevention of disease.

Following its extensive growth over the past number of years, UCC's Department of Epidemiology and Public Health, has now become the School of Public Health.


Established in 1997, it has grown from a small department of just one staff member to become one of the largest national academic centres for epidemiology and public health. The vision for the School is to be at the heart of society's organised efforts to prevent disease and to protect and promote the health and wellbeing of the population.

Professor Ivan Perry, Head of the School of Public Health said, "In concept and design, the UCC School of Public Health is modelled on international schools of Public Health in Britain, Continental Europe and North America. The School will have a clear and explicit focus on research and advocacy in population health, health services and health systems research."

The School will incorporate the National Health Services Research Institute, which was established with funding from the Higher Education Authority (PRTLI-5), and the HRB funded Centre for Health & Diet Research. It will operate in collaboration and synergy with the National Cancer Registry, the National Suicide Research Foundation, the National Perinatal Epidemiology Centre, the HRB Clinical Research Facility at the Mercy University Hospital Cork, UCC's Oral Health Services Research Centre and the Department of Public Health HSE-South.



USE OF TEXT MESSAGING IN GENERAL PRACTICE



A publication titled 'Use of text messaging in general practice: a mixed methods investigation on GPs' and patients' views' was recently published in the *British Journal of General Practice*. The publication is a collaboration between the GP Training Scheme, Frontline GPs, and Academia.


The paper addressed the issue of text messaging in General Practice, which has become more prevalent as a tool with which to communicate with patients. There are in excess of 1 million text messages sent by Irish GPs to their patients annually. The paper warranted a mention in the editorial of the *British Journal of General Practice* as well as a special comment by the President of the Royal College of General Practitioners.

Crosslinguistic Encounters in Language Acquisition: Typical and Atypical Develoment



Professor Nicole Müller, Head of Department of Speech & Hearning Sciences, recently edited a book titled 'Crosslinguistic Encounters in Language Acquisition: Typical and Atypical Develoment' in collaboration with Elena Babatsouli, Director of the Institute of Monolingual and Bilingual Speech in Chania, Greece, and Professor David Ingram, Department of Speech and Hearing Sciences, Arizona State University, USA. This volume presents original research studies on typical and atypical child language

acquisition in monolingual, bilingual and bi-dialectal settings. Languages investigated in the studies include languages underrepresented in published research, such as Farsi, Greek, Icelandic, isiXhosa, Maltese, Mandarin and Slovene, without excluding representative work in major languages like English and Spanish. The book has practical significance in that it proposes tools and assessment practices that are of universal cross-linguistic relevance while also dealing with language-specific complications.

A book titled 'Self-Neglect in Older Adults: A Global, Evidence-Based Resource for Nurses and Other Healthcare Providers' was recently launched. The book was edited by Dr Mary Rose Day (retired), Emeritus Professor Geraldine McCarthy, and Professor Joyce Fitzpatrick. It provides nurses, geriatricians, healthcare professionals and community organisations with a comprehensive overview and analysis of self-neglect in older adults. With an aging global population, self-neglect is emerging as a complex problem that crosses multiple disciplines of health and social care. Characterized by a harmful inattention to health and hygiene, self-neglect manifests in a variety of ways across the world that healthcare professionals need to be able to recognise and manage.

Dr Tim O'Sullivan Recipient of UCC Teaching & Learning Award

Congratulations to Dr Tim O'Sullivan, Lecturer in Pharmaceutical Chemistry from the School of Pharmacy and School of Chemistry, who is recipient of a UCC Teaching & Learning Award. Dr O'Sullivan was nominated by the Head of School of Pharmacy, Professor Stephen Byrne, for recognition of his diligence in enhancing student learning in a structured and innovative manner. Professor Byrne states that Dr O'Sullivan has been instrumental in the development of novel teaching methods in the area of pharmaceutical chemistry, with particular emphasis on assessment for learning, where students are given the tools to apply their theoretical knowledge to real-world applications. He has been successful in securing external funding for this work and has disseminated the findings of his teaching and learning enquiry to the pharmacy and chemical education communities. His work has been extensively published. He was recognized in 2013 at UCC with an Award for Research into Innovative Forms of Teaching and in 2016 was named a UCC Digital Champion. Dr O'Sullivan completed the Certificate in Teaching & Learning in Higher Education in 2015.

Professor George Shorten named 2017 Goudsouzian Scholar

Congratulations to Professor George Shorten, Professor of Anaesthesia and Intensive Care Medicine, UCC, who has been named as the 2017 Goudsouzian Scholar by Massachusetts General Hospital / Harvard Medical School. This Scholarship honours Professor Nishan Goudsouzian, a pioneer in the development of paediatric anaesthesia whose work fundamentally advanced the use of neuromuscular blocking agents in infants and children. Professor Shorten recently delivered the Goudsouzian Scholar lecture at Massachusetts General Hospital on "Are we good at what we do – the future of evidence-based training in healthcare". His presentation included a description of the work done at the ASSERT Centre, UCC on developing Proficiency-based Progression training in surgery, anaesthesia and other disciplines.

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


ATLANTIC CORRIDOR MEDICAL STUDENT RESEARCH CONFERENCE

The School of Medicine recently hosted the 4th Atlantic Corridor Medical Student Research Conference. This intervarsity undergraduate research showcase provided an opportunity to enjoy presentations on a diverse range of clinical and translational medical research projects completed across two of the 'Atlantic Corridor' medical schools – UCC and NUIG. The programme included a stimulating mixture of oral and poster presentations, in addition to a plenary lecture by Professor Denis O'Mahony, Department of Medicine.

The conference was concluded with a prize-giving ceremony, where two awards were distributed for best poster and best oral presentation. The poster prize was awarded to Ms Diyana Nasir, NUIG, for her poster titled 'Vitamin D levels in Irish children with type 1 Diabetes Mellitus: A cross-sectional study.' The oral prize was awarded to Mr Cian Duggan, UCC, for his oral presentation titled "An exploration of the effectiveness of an educational intervention on the use of personal protective equipment in orthopaedic theatres."

Dental Students Visit Nepal on Outreach Programme



A group of BDS IV students from the Dental School & Hospital recently visited Nepal on the UCC Dental Outreach Programme. UCC undergraduate dental students have a long-standing tradition of participating in the programme and aiding people who need, but do not have access to dental care.

The 2017 programme was organised by a community based not-for-profit organisation called Around Good People (AGP). The students carried out AGP's stated mission to 'deliver oral health care, servicing thousands of people, at no charge, throughout the mountain communities of Nepal'.

The students gave local schoolchildren oral hygiene instructions, toothbrushes and fluoride treatments. Villagers were screened, blood pressure and blood glucose levels recorded and triaged, with the more urgent cases being treated first. Treatments involved scaling, restorations and extractions. Over seven days on-site, the students managed to screen and treat over 1,600 villagers.

The visit was a huge social, cultural and professional experience for everyone in the group.





Carol Condon and Nuala Walshe Visit Bradford University

Ms Carol Condon & Ms Nuala Walshe, UCC School of Nursing & Midwifery recently travelled to Bradford University for the inaugural research meeting of a project titled 'Optimizing patient safety through culturally competent simulation-based education with health professionals'. Using the acronym 'Sim-versity' (Simulation-Diversity), the project aims to stimulate the development and implementation of web-based resources as a novel approach to optimizing patient safety. The research team involves researchers from UK, Ireland, Finland and Slovenia and has been funded through Erasmus+ 2017 Key Action 203 Strategic Partnerships for Higher Education Fund.

LAUNCH OF NEW NURSING MODULE

Minister for Health Simon Harris TD officially launched Ireland's first accredited National Foundation Education Module in Critical Care Nursing. The School of Nursing and Midwifery, UCC in partnership with the School of Nursing, Midwifery and Health Systems, UCD are very proud of their role in the accreditation, delivery and assessment of the National Foundation Education Module, which recently commenced in UCD and UCC. 

In recognition of the Irish contribution to the field of Neuroscience, the Ambassador of Ireland Daniel Mulhall hosted Irish delegates of the Society for Neuroscience conference in Washington DC to an Irish Neuroscience Social at the Embassy of Ireland in Washington DC.

During his speech, Ambassador Mulhall commended the advancement of research in Neuroscience in Ireland in recent years, and commented on the enthusiasm and vibrancy of Irish researchers. In his address, Professor John Cryan, Head of UCC Department of Anatomy & Neuroscience, emphasised the global nature of neuroscience research and how Ireland's neuroscience community, despite being relatively small, contributes greatly to this effort.

Doctoral Travel Bursaries

The Graduate School in the College of Medicine and Health is inviting applications for up to 10 awards of Travel Bursaries for students currently registered for a doctoral degree (PhD/ MD/ Doctorate) in the College of Medicine and Health.

The purpose of these awards is twofold:

- To facilitate students who wish to present their work at an international conference.
- To facilitate the training of students who wish to acquire skills that are essential for their academic development, but which they cannot otherwise receive in UCC.

Applicants can apply for up to €1,000 in financial support that may be used towards the cost of travel, accommodation and registration fees for international conferences or relevant training courses that are due to take place between 1st October 2017 and 30th September 2018.
