Some improvements have been made; a new Senior Lecturer in International Business will have some input into the programme and the Department of Government have appointed a Chinese speaking lecturer.
That a part-time teaching allocation should be established for the BComm (European) Degree so as to encourage and support initiatives to strengthen the comparative European dimension in teaching and learning in this Degree. The engagement of the departments with the Board of Studies is under active consideration by the Board of Studies.
That the relationship between the Board of Studies and the relevant Subject Librarian(s) should be formalised in order to enhance awareness of the needs of the students in the Programme and to consider options for improving the current situation.	Recommendation endorsed.	Implemented The subject librarian is now a member of the Board of Studies.

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That the options of offering (i) diplomas from the partner university in recognition of the year students spend abroad and (ii) double degrees with partner universities be explored.	Recommendation endorsed. The QPC noted that this is an issue under discussion at the national and sectoral levels and recommended awaiting the outcome of these discussions before taking any specific actions. The issue is also closely linked to the Bologna Process and is under active consideration at the European level.	Not implemented This recommendation is being actively explored. The Board of Studies will be advised by their partner Universities on this matter.
That the Board of Studies explore the possibility of establishing a European/International Masters Programme, perhaps building on academic expertise from the Programme's partner universities where such programmes are developing strongly.	Recommendation endorsed.	Not implemented The programme curriculum has been developed and approved. However staff are required to implement it.
That the possibility of creating a BComm (European) Centre should be explored.	Recommendation noted. QPC referred this recommendation for consideration to the Head of the College of BL. The Swiss and Italian Embassies are very involved and the Chinese Ambassador recently launched the BComm (International) in Chinese Studies. An application has been made to the German authorities for a teaching assistant in the area of German business.

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That consideration be given to creating a senior position, at an appropriately senior level, aimed at ensuring the promotion and coordination of interdisciplinary studies across the University. The QPC noted that the Committee established by Academic Council to consider interdisciplinary degrees and their academic management has reported to AC and the recommendations are being looked at and will be discussed further in the Autumn.
