SCHOOL NEWS

Lancet Global Burden of Disease (GBD) Alcohol Collaborators' Study

Congratulations to <u>Dr Zubair Kabir</u> - Senior Lecturer at the School of Public Health, who contributed to a landmark publication as a co-author, in *The Lancet* on 23 August 2018. The study titled "Alcohol use and burden for 195 countries and territories, 1990-2016: a systematic review for the Global Burden of Disease Study 2016" was undertaken by the Global Burden of Disease (GBD) Alcohol Collaborators' and <u>Dr Kabir</u> is one of the two GBD collaborators from Ireland. The study had a one-line powerful message that "there is no safe level in alcohol consumption on improving health". Recently, <u>Dr Kabir</u> has become a member of the WHO-European Burden of Disease Network (EBoDN) representing Ireland at the EU level. He expresses deep concern that Irish women were one of the 7 top alcohol drinkers in the world-consuming on an average of 3.1 drinks every day. <u>Dr Kabir</u> strongly thinks that a comprehensive burden of disease (BoD) study in Ireland is necessary for informing health policy and improving population health in Ireland.





Dr Karen Matvienko-Sikar presented her work on "Core Outcome Sets in Health Psychology". Dr Sheena McHugh presented research on ""Around the edges": characterising a multilevel implementation intervention using behaviour change techniques". Caragh Flannery presented research on "Physical activity interventions for overweight and obesity during pregnancy: A systematic review" and "Exploring health care professionals approach to lifestyle management in pregnant women with a BMI ≥25". Ailbhe Spillane presented her research on "How do people experience a family member's highly lethal self-harm? A qualitative study."

Ms Sarah Buggy, who is currently a Masters Student on the Health Promotion Pathway in the School of Public Health, presented her research on "Effects of Maternal Stress, Depression, and Self-Esteem on Children's Dietary Intake at 18 months". Sarah was funded in her Masters to complete this research via a Children's Research Network grant awarded to Dr Karen Matvienko-Sikar and Professor Patricia Kearney. Sarah did an excellent job presenting her research and representing the School of Public Health, and her presentation was very well received by the audience of international delegates.




Dr. Karen Matvienko-Sikar presenting her work on core outcome sets and health psychology

Teaching & Learning Research and Enhancement Fund Grant for Dr Brendan Palmer to deliver R workshops.

<u>Dr Brendan Palmer</u> (School of Public Health and the CRF-C) and <u>Dr Adam Kane</u> (School of Biological, Environmental and Earth Sciences) have recently been jointly awarded a Teaching & Learning Research and Enhancement grant from UCC. This fund facilitates staff to develop their teaching and support of learning in innovative ways. Both <u>Dr Palmer</u> and <u>Dr Kane</u> have previously delivered training courses through the R statistical programming language. With this fund, they aim to build on their previous independent initiatives and deliver a comprehensive R course to staff and students this coming academic year.

The aim of this project will be to give a comprehensive introduction to the implementation of statistics which is complemented with data management and documentation modules to facilitate research reproducibility. The workshops will be conducted through the R software programming environment. R is a free software package that encompasses data analysis, visualisation and documentation and has become the industry standard in many fields, including biology, and statistics itself. Advances in R software development, namely the reorganisation of popular R packages under the umbrella banner of the "tidyverse", has made R accessible to a wider audience. This has numerous benefits, chief amongst them being that R, as a programming language, has become more human readable, intuitive and, importantly, accessible.

This coming academic year a combination of workshops for new (3 \times 3-day intensive course) and experienced (3 \times 1-day course) R users will be offered. Students and staff looking to incorporate reproducible workflows into their current research practises are encouraged to attend. European Congress of Epidemiology Conference

Staff and students of the School of Public Health; Professor Ivan Perry, Professor Patricia Kearney, Dr Janas Harrington, Ms Kate O'Neill, Ms Niamh Bambury and Dr Darren Dahly attended the European Congress of Epidemiology Conference in Lyon from 4th – 6th June 2018. The theme of this year's meeting was "Crises, epidemiological transitions and the role of epidemiologists". Professor Kearney was among three international speakers who delivered a welcoming address and opened the Conference. Darren gave an oral presentation titled, "Associations between maternal lifestyle factors and neonatal body composition in the screening for pregnancy endpoints (Cork) cohort study". Niamh gave an oral presentation, "A review of management of latent tuberculosis infection (LTBI) in a TB contact tracing service in Cork, Ireland"

and a poster presentation, "Trends in renal transplantation among people with Diabetes in Ireland". <u>Janas</u> gave an oral presentation of her work "Breakfast skipping and overweight/obesity among European adolescents, a cross-sectional analysis of the Helena dataset: a DEDIPAC study". <u>Kate</u> presented on her PhD work titled "Impact of a Reduction in Sugar Sweetened Beverage Consumption on Type 2 Diabetes Incidence: Comparative Risk Assessment Study". 

Enterprise Ireland Funding for Karen



The aim of the award is to facilitate preparation and submission of a competitive proposal to any of the European Research Council funding schemes. The funded project is titled: *Maternal stress and child overweight and obesity:* psychological, physiological and behavioural mechanisms.

Open Science @ UCC Conference

Open Science (a) UCC is a 3-day workshop offering a comprehensive interdisciplinary introduction to open science research. Following the conference attendees will be better placed to incorporate open science techniques into their own research and prepared to respond to growing funding obligations aligned to reproducible science practices.

The event will be a mixture of lectures, tutorials, and participant-driven un-conferencing. There will also be opportunities for small-group discussion and social sessions to help form a local support network of open science advocates within UCC.

The workshop will take place the Creative Zone, located in the Boole Library. Topics to be covered will include reproducible research methods, data packaging, emerging

Cork Beats Stress is a joined initiative between the GAA, Cork City Council and HSE Psychology services in Cork. The programme is unique to Cork in that it delivers community based Psychological Services through a large sporting organization, a novel concept both nationally and internationally.

The School is very proud of its link with Cork Beats Stress, through Dr. Janas Harrington. Janas is the Director of the BSc. in Public Health Sciences in the School, a member of the GAA National Health and Wellbeing Committee and a member of the Barrs Healthy Club Team. Janas spoke at the launch of Cork Beats Stress in City Chambers on behalf of the National Health and Wellbeing Committee, explaining the background to the initiative, its benefits to the community to date and the importance of collaboration between different organisiations to develop and promote public health initiatives like Cork Beats Stress; "The Cork Beats Stress initiative was originally set up as a partnership between the GAA Healthy Club Initiative and HSE Psychology Services in 2013. Over 1600 people from Cork have already directly benefitted many clubs

across the county hosting it. Delivering services in this way has meant bringing high quality and practical support into the heart of local communities for local communities".
