Planned home birth with the HSE 2020



In Ireland, 0.4% of all births occurred at home in 2020. There were 345 women who registered for a home birth with 199 women giving birth at home.

Average number of visits

The average number of antepartum visits by the Self Employed Community Midwife (SECM) to women registered for a homebirth was six.



Almost three quarters of women who registered for a home birth in 2020 had a previous pregnancy.

One in three women


were transferred to a maternity hospital due to complications arising during the antepartum period.

The average distance from the woman's residence to the SECM and the maternity unit was within 30km.

Almost 21% of women

who began labouring at home were transferred to the maternity hospital in the intrapartum period, with the vast majority occurring during the first stage of labour (90%).



First time mothers were **three times** more likely to transfer during labour than women who had a previous birth (70% versus 30%).




On average, the mothers received **six postpartum visits** from the SECM.

97.5%

On the day of discharge from the SECM 97.5% of mothers were **breastfeeding**.





Six of all infants

who were born at home were transferred to a maternity hospital. Of these, three were admitted to the neonatal intensive care unit and later discharged alive and well back to the care of the SECM.
