
The Vermont Oxford Network in Ireland





The Vermont Oxford Network (VON) is a non-profit voluntary collaboration of health care professionals dedicated to improving the care of very low birth weight infants, i.e. those born ≤1500g and/or ≤29 weeks. The VON maintains a database of information regarding their care and outcomes, collecting from over 900 Neonatal Intensive Care Units (NICUs) worldwide. The NPEC facilitates membership of the VON on behalf of all 19 neonatal units in Ireland, making it possible to have composite national data on all very low birth weight infants born in Ireland.



2014-2016: 3 years of VON data incorporating every neonatal unit in Ireland - 1,812 babies

19 NEONATAL UNITS

All 19 neonatal units in Ireland are participating. Participation in the VON in Ireland is funded by the National Perinatal Epidemiology Centre. The NPEC co-ordinates data submission, manages the data and compiles the annual audit report.

Eligibility Criteria

Any live born infant whose birth weight is from 401 to 1500 grams OR whose gestational age is from 22 weeks 0 days to 29 weeks 6 days and who is:

- Inborn and admitted to your hospital;
- Inborn and dies in the delivery room or any other location in your hospital before admission: OR
- Outborn and admitted to your hospital within 28 days of birth.

Target follow-up duration: 1 year

Benefits

AT UNIT LEVEL

- Provision of an annual unit-specific report for use in risk management, quality management and internal audit.
- Access to Nightingale, the VON internet reporting system which facilitates member units to view their own data and benchmark against other units.

AT NATIONAL LEVEL

- A National Dataset spanning three years
- Raw Anonymised Data returned to NPEC
- Data can be re-analysed at national level so that specific questions pertinent to Ireland can be addressed.





Figure 2: Neonatal centres in the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland participating in the Vermont Oxford Network. ROI centres are classified according to number of births weighing 500g or more in the associated obstetric centres in 2015.
