
The atmosphere was filled with pride as families, friends, and faculty gathered to honor the achievements of our newest alumni.

Since the opening of the "Breathe... Catching images for health" fundraiser exhibition in May,, artist Jules Versluis has been invited to share his art in two international expositions.




"Breathe..." Fundraiser Update



World No Tobacco Day

UCC has held another successful annual outreach event to mark World No Tobacco Day - May 31st.

World No Tobacco Day (WNTD) was established in 1987 following a World Health Assembly resolution and is observed annually on May 31st. This date also marks the 2003 adoption of the WHO Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (FCTC), the first international treaty aimed at reducing tobacco use and its harmful effects. WNTD focuses on tobacco prevention, raising awareness of its dangers, and promoting effective policies to reduce consumption. The tobacco industry also contributes to environmental degradation and the exploitation of vulnerable communities.

Implementation Science Training Institute 2024

In July 2024, Dr Sheena McHugh hosted the Implementation Science Training Institute (ISTI) at Nano Nagle Place as part of the activities of the *Health Implementation Research Hub* (HIRH) in the School of Public Health. ISTI is funded by the Health Research Board Research Leader Award.

Twenty-six PhD students, researchers, academics, and practitioners participated in the blended training programme. Following the completion of five online modules, trainees participated in a variety of activities over the course of three days including:

- Lectures from international leaders in the field
- Small group work and project feedback
- Peer networking
- Q&A with international experts
- Mentoring opportunities

Fai Ng



Professor Fai Ng took up the position of Director of the HRB CRF-UCC in March 2024. In addition, he is a consultant rheumatologist with globally recognized expertise and is a key opinion leader in Sjögren's syndrome and fatigue research. He has led numerous early-phase clinical trials and experimental medicine studies. Prof. Ng has published extensively in his field, with over 170 peer-reviewed articles, seven book chapters, and other notable contributions to the literature on Sjögren's syndrome, as well as securing >£60m in recent grant income.

He was previously the Director of the NIHR Clinical Research Facility in Newcastle. He qualified from Cambridge University, completed his rheumatology training in London, and obtained a PhD in

Immunology at Imperial College London.

A EUROPEAN CLUSTER CONTRIBUTING TO LIVING AND WORKING IN A HEALTH-PROMOTING ENVIRONMENTS

The digital and green shifts, often called the 'twin transition,' are rapidly transforming workplaces. These changes include new work formats like hybrid work and gig jobs, and new management methods such as algorithm-driven decisions and digital performance monitoring. These shifts impact working conditions, income, and health for both skilled and unskilled workers. They also contribute to the high costs of work-related illnesses and accidents for employers and the European economy.

Mental health and ergonomic issues are major concerns for many EU workers. Musculoskeletal disorders (MSDs) are among the most common work-related health issues in the EU. Many workers and managers also see stress, depression, and anxiety as serious workplace problems. While changes in work organization can offer more flexibility and bring more people into the workforce, they can also cause psychosocial problems like job insecurity, privacy invasion, lack of rest, poor occupational safety and health (OSH) protections, and stress from long or irregular working hours and constant performance monitoring by Al.



The WISEWORK-C cluster, starting in June 2024 in Porto, Portugal, aims to tackle these challenges. It seeks to enhance cooperation, avoid redundancy, and boost the impact of projects funded under the call <u>HORIZON-HİTH-2023-ENVHLTH-02-02</u>, focuses on evidence-based interventions promote mental and physical health in changing work environments, especially post-pandemic

3 shared groups to realise the WISEWORK-C cluster's work

The WISEWORK-C cluster aims to raise awareness about the EU initiatives for public health, occupational health, and sustainable working environments by increasing the visibility of the research projects, maximizing the spread of their results at institutional and academic levels, and influencing key stakeholders. To achieve its goal the WISEWORK-C cluster has initially created 3 working groups (WG):

- WG1: Science translation for policy and practice.
- WG2: Data analysis/management and protection.
- WG3: Communication and Dissemination.

5 projects involving over 60 organisations and €30M in funding

The WISEWORK-C cluster involves over 60 organisations and partners across 5 projects, funded by the European Health and Digital Executive Agency (HaDEA) under the Horizon Europe's

<u>EU-CoWork</u>'s ambition is to develop an evidence basis for and subsequently develop, test and evaluate tailored compassionate workplaces program in Europe, INTERCAMBIO aims at promoting mental and physical health of workers in changing work environments due to climate change, <u>PROSPERH</u> and <u>WAge</u> focus on improving physical and mental health in workplaces by developing and validating the multi-level and inclusive interventions, and <u>SONATA</u> addresses the dissatisfaction of workers about their workplace design by implementing architectural adaptive technologies on a personal scale.



Problem Drug Use in Cork City Project



WISEWORK-C

In this HSE-Cork and Kerry funded project, which is being led by Dr Seán Millar from the School of Public Health and Dr Michael Byrne, Head of the Student Health Department at UCC, estimates on the prevalence of problem drug use, numbers in treatment, non-fatal overdose cases, drug-related deaths, self-harm related to drug use and number of syringes exchanged in Cork city for the years 2019–2023 will be assessed using a number of data sources. The main output for this project will be a published report for use by HSE Drug Treatment Services.

30th British Isles Research Workshop on Suicide and Self-harm

NSRF team members Prof Ella Arensman, Dr. Eve Griffin, Dr Paul Corcoran, Dr Selena O'Connell and Mr Niall McTernan attended the Lancet Psychiatry/University of Oxford Centre for Suicide Research New Horizons in Suicide Research and Policy Symposium and the 30th British Isles Workshop on Research on Suicide and Self-Harm on May 14th and 15th.



Global Leadership Exchange Comprehensive Community Suicide Prevention Match



The National Suicide Research Foundation were delighted to welcome international guests from the U.S, Canada, New Zealand, Scotland and England to University College Cork on June 24th and 25th for a two day Global Leadership Exchange Comprehensive Community Suicide Prevention Match.

The 'Match' drew on the experiences, lessons learned and knowledge of participants to explore the role of data and surveillance in informing suicide prevention action plans - including efforts to respond to emerging trends in at-risk groups, as well as informing policy changes which impact on collective and community-based suicide prevention efforts.

WHOCC Redesignation

THE WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION HAS REDESIGNATED THE NSRF AS A WHO COLLABORATING CENTRE FOR SURVEILLANCE AND RESEARCH IN SUICIDE PREVENTION UNTIL 2027

WHO collaborating centres are institutions which are designated by the WHO to carry out activities in support of the WHO's programmes at country, intercountry, regional, interregional and global levels.

The NSRF has been a WHO Collaborating Centre for 8 years following initial designation in December 2015 and has provided technical advice to inform WHO's work in establishing surveillance systems of self-harm and suicide, as well as in implementing and evaluating national suicide prevention programmes.

This work has spanned across more than 20 countries, including Namibia, Iran, Ecuador and Trinidad & Tobago. In particular, the template of the National Self-Harm Registry Ireland has been central in informing surveillance of self-harm internationally.

NSRF and WHO, with support from the Department of Health in Ireland, will continue to build on this collaboration, by providing technical support informing the establishment of surveillance systems of self-harm and suicide and improving suicide monitoring in specific countries; and guiding and supporting countries in establishing national suicide prevention strategies and implementation, including evaluation plans and measurable indicators.

Suicide Prevention Training for Health and Social Care Students: Module Pilot Launch

On World Suicide Prevention Day, September 10th, a four-week pilot of the module for 1st -4th year health care students at University College Cork (UCC) and University College Dublin (UCD) was launched.

The module content is structured into four weekly two-hour in-person sessions, covering critical topics including risk and protective factors, effective communication skills and safety planning. The findings from this pilot will inform future iterations of the module and the development of a train-the-trainer programme, ultimately making suicide prevention education available to all health care courses nationally. Public and Patient Involvement in Mental Health Research Event




The National Suicide Research Foundation and PPI Ignite Network @UCC held a one-day research symposium in the Dr Dora Allman Room, University College Cork on Monday May 20th, 2024. We heard from a number of speakers including Dr Leah Quinlivan, Dan Stears and Liz Monaghan from the University of Manchester, Dr Lydia Sapouna from UCC, Dr Maria Quinlan from HSE Research and Development, Anita Whyte from the Dual Diagnosis Clinical Programme, Kathyan Kelly, Jaqui Noble and Myrice Kelly from Seeking Safety Ireland and Aileen Callanan from the NSRF.

Topics covered on the day included PPI involvement and engagement in self-harm and suicide prevention research, a discussion on power and epistemic (in)justice in relation to PPI or user involvement, trauma informed research – implications for PPI and a case study of Seeking Safety Ireland. The day provided staff, students and stakeholders with an opportunity for networking and learning from national and international experts.

CONFERENCES & SEMINARS













The event was attended by academics and researchers from across UCC as well as attendees from the Health Service Executive and the charity sector. We were joined by world-renowned guest speaker Dr Rinad Beidas, Chair and Ralph Seal Paffenbarger Professor of Medical Social Sciences at the Feinberg School of Medicine at Northwestern University. Dr Beidas shared her insights on how implementation science can help professionals, leaders, and health organisations to use best practices to improve the quality and equity of care and enhance health outcomes. Dr Sheena McHugh spoke about the challenges and opportunities for implementation research in the Irish health system with examples from her own work. Talks were followed by a panel discussion with Dr Justin Presseau, Dr Michael Sykes, Dr Bianca Albers and Dr Rinad Beidas, who shared their experiences leading implementation research in the US, Canada and Europe. Finally, Professor Helen Whelton gave the closing highlighting the increasing need collaboration between academia and the health service. Professor Ella Arensman emphasized the need for transferable skills in implementation research across Public Health priorities.

The event was captured beautifully in a graphic record created by Hazel Hurley. The event is part of the networking and capacity building activities funded by Dr McHugh's Research Leader Award from the Health Research Board.


Festival Launch Event

The process allows me to share my own experience but also to represent those with no voice at the table and hopefully feed into more open accessible research and health developments for everyone in the future. I would also like to encourage other patients to get involved with the process to create a wider and more diverse range of participants in PPI to positively support and influence the research of the future."



2nd PROSPERH Plenary Progress meeting in St Mary's University, London



The PROSPERH Consortium met for it's second plenary progress meeting in St. Mary's University in London on June 20th and 21st, 2024. Partners shared their work progress updates from the first six months of the project and plans for the next six months were discussed. Our EU Project Officer Dr Sara Brazys attended online and provided valuable input into the discussions.

Prof Ella Arensman shared reflections and progress on the first six months of the project as well as updates on overall project management, WISEWORK-C cluster activities, and looking ahead to the cluster randomised controlled trial. Dr Eve Griffin provided updates on the status and work to date of an ongoing scoping review led by the NSRF related to barriers and facilitators to implementing mental and physical health interventions in the workplace. Dr Caleb Leduc collaborated with colleagues from the National Research Centre for the Working Environment to present and discuss the plans underway for an umbrella and living review focused on the impact of workplace changes on health.

From the UCC and NSRF team, Prof Ella Arensman, Dr Eve Griffin, Karen Mulcahy, Margaret Kenneally, Dr Mallorie Leduc, Dr Maura Smiddy participated in the meeting.

ASPHER Seminar in Porto

At the Dean's and Director's Panel on Future of Public Health Research and Practice, on 7th June in Porto, Prof Ella Arensman presented on the outcomes of the EU Horizon 2020 project: Mental Health Promotion and Intervention in Occupational Settings (MENTUPP), and she presented on the priorities of the new EU Horizon Europe PROSPERH project, with a focus on challenges related to mental and physical health in changing work environments, including long term impacts of the Covid-19 pandemic, war and conflict and climate related changes. At the ASPHER Conference, Colette Cunningham was involved in seminars of the Taskforce on War, Taskforce on Emergencies in Public Health, and meetings of the ASPHER-WHO Core Curriculum Programme.

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
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
