Programme Philosophy

Public health is defined as the art and science of improving the health of the population through the organised efforts of society. Infectious Diseases, a very significant public health issue, are largely preventable but to do so take a combination of policies, politics, knowledge, education, organisation, collaboration and determination. The study of health protection involves a wide range of theoretical disciplines and practical skills. This Postgraduate certificate seeks to provide a robust grounding in practice focused education from which students may continue to develop their professional effectiveness.

Course Objectives

On successful completion of this programme students should be able to;

- Investigate the transmission of endemic and epidemic infections from sufficient knowledge of the characteristics and transmission of causative organisms.
- Select appropriate methods of infection prevention and control.
- Design, implement and evaluate coordinated infection prevention and control methods.

- Assess the constraints of health. protection delivery services.
- Describe the global impact of infectious diseases and strategies which are effective, partially effective and ineffective in management and prevention of disease.
- Discuss the wider aspects of health protection.
- · Discuss effective methods to introduce and implement practice change.

Who is the Course Intended For?

This Postgraduate Certificate in Health Protection is offered by the Department of Epidemiology and Public Health within the College of Medicine and Health in University College Cork.

The programme is designed to meet the learning needs of all those who have an interest or who are directly responsible for preventing and managing healthcareassociated infections (HCAI) in primary, secondary or tertiary care. In addition it will introduce students to the wider aspects of health protection from a public health perspective. This programme will provide students with the knowledge and skills to support and implement the development of infection prevention and control programmes in healthcare settings.


Successful graduates of the Postgraduate
