







Number of cases vaccinated 35 30 25 Unvaccinated ■ Vaccinated **UCC** Actions taken Many initially commenced on antibiotics before outbreak recognised • Public Health Dept. notified (day 2 LTCF#1; day 4 LTCF#2) • Prompt IP&C measures implemented ➤Isolation ➤Staff exclusion ≻Appropriate PPE >Visitor restriction/information signs >Respiratory etiquette and hand hygiene **UCC** Actions taken contd.... \bullet Viral Throat swabs taken and sent to NVRL on advice of DPH Commencement of treatment and prophylactic anti viral therapy e.g. Tamiflu, on advice of DPH Cancellation of recreational activities and non essential appointments · Closure of wards to admissions and transfers • Review of staff / resident vaccination history Early recognition of outbreak important to reduce spread of infection
