The Inter-professional Education and Collaborative Practice in Healthcare initiative

Dr Maria Roura, Dr Janas Harrington and Dr Karen Matvienko-Sikar are members of the Steering Group of the Interprofessional Education and Collaborative Practice in Healthcare initiative led by the HSE Office of Nursing and Midwifery Services. The different schools of the College of Medicine, as well as service users and student representatives, are involved in this pilot project. CoMH Learning and Teaching Showcase

The showcase was opened by Dr Francis Burke, Vice-Dean Academic Affairs, and included a keynote by Professor Albert Leung on Delivering Continuing Professional Development.

Colette Cunningham delivered an oral presentation on 'Moving our presentations into the 21st Century – the experience of using Articulate Rise for the School of Public Health Teaching'. Along with other colleagues from the School, Christie also presented a poster on the day.

LINK (Learning how to create Integrated community Networks through Knowledge exchange)

The **LINK** project ran from May 2021 to May 2022 and was funded by an Irish Research Council New Foundations Award, 'Enhancing Civic Society' (PI: Dr Sheena McHugh) which supports projects between researchers and civic society groups in the community and voluntary sector. Fiona Riordan and Tanya van de Water worked with a local befriending service to understand service delivery during the COVID-19 pandemic and explore how the service links in with community healthcare services.

COVID-19 has increased the focus on befriending services as a way to connect with and support older people and individuals with physical and mental disabilities who may be vulnerable, cocooning, and lonely. Integrating and coordinating health and social care services around an individual's needs, is posited to improve quality of care, user satisfaction and health system efficiency. Though research on befriending services is growing internationally, most studies to date have focused on evaluating the effectiveness of these services and few have focused on how these services are implemented. There is a dearth of research on how these services operate in Ireland.

The project involved interviews and focus groups with befriending service coordinators, volunteers, and health care professionals working in the community. A stakeholder workshop was hosted to co-produce an action plan for the service. On May 26th the Fiona and Tanya hosted a public webinar 'Providing connection during COVID-19: Exploring the implementation of Friendly Call Cork' which was attended by a mix of researchers, staff from voluntary organisations, volunteers, and health care professionals.


Postdoc researchers at 5th UK Implementation Science Research Conference

Dr Susan Calnan and Dr Fiona Riordan, postdoctoral researchers in the SPH, presented at the 5th UK Implementation Science Research Conference. The conference, a leading multidisciplinary implementation research conference, was hosted virtually by King's College London on the 14th and 15th July. Susan presented the results of a study conducted among senior stakeholders in the HSE, entitled 'Experiences and perceptions of evidence use among senior health service stakeholders: A qualitative study'. Fiona delivered two rapid fire poster presentations on interim findings from an ongoing study 'Tailoring strategies to support the implementation of **D**ose **A**djustment **f**or **N**ormal **E**ating (**DAfNE**), a structured patient education programme for people with Type 1 diabetes' and a protocol for a scoping review 'Characterising processes and outcomes of tailoring implementation strategies in healthcare: a protocol for a scoping review'.

BSc Public Health Students expanding internationally!

The European experience - UNIC European Generations CityLabs programme 2021/22

Rachel Jackson (3rd year BSc in Public Health Sciences student) was selected to join a competitive UNIC European University 'Generation's CityLab' programme while on work placement. The European University of Post Industrial Cities (UNIC) is an alliance of eight universities from eight European countries: University of Deusto (Spain), Ruhr University Bochum (Germany), University College Cork (Ireland), Koç University (Turkey), University of Liège (Belgium), University of Oulu (Finland), University of Zagreb (Croatia) and Erasmus University Rotterdam (coordinator, the Netherlands). The UNIC alliance reflects a strong European post-industrial identity by shaping a new generation of Europeans able to cooperate and work within different European and



global cultures, in different languages, and across borders, sectors and academic disciplines.

The European experience — the student's story



The UNIC CityLabs is a European programme and its aim is to connect students from eight different European Universities with city stakeholders to co-create innovative solutions to real-life urban problems in society. I was fortunate to be selected for this programme as one of the students representing UCC in 2022. We participated in virtual intensive learning seminars throughout May, in which they provide us with the tools to engage our critical thinking and problem-solving skills. It was incredibly team-focused, which I loved, as we were placed in teams made up of students from the different universities in

During this period, it was truly unforgettable as you get to explore the city of Oulu, learn so much about the culture and get the Finnish student experience. I gained valuable skills, increased my self-confidence and made many international friends - thus I recommend it to any student who wants to apply.

New report on Irish findings from the European Web Survey on Drugs published

The European Monitoring Centre for Drugs and Drug Addiction (EMCDDA) has developed the European Web Survey on Drugs (EWSD) to collect data from a wide range of people who use drugs. In 2021, Ireland participated in the **EWSD** for the first time. Information was collected from 5,796 people across Ireland and a report showing the main findings was published in August 2022. The report's authors are Dr Seán Millar, research support officer and post-doctoral researcher in the School of Public Health, Dr Deirdre Mongan and Mr Brian Galvin of the Health Research Board (HRB), and Ms Nicki Killeen, Mr David Evans and Dr Eamon Keenan of the Health Service Executive (HSE). Some key findings from the report include the following:

- Among the survey sample of people who reported using drugs in the last year, cannabis was the most commonly used drug, followed by cocaine, MDMA and ketamine.
- In the last year, 36% of respondents had used one drug, 20% used two different drugs and 44% used three or more.

- Among 18-to 24-year-old respondents, 55% of males and 50% of females had used three or more drugs in the past year.
- Ketamine use was reported by almost onequarter of overall respondents. More than one-third of 18–24-year-old males reported using ketamine in the last year.

Commenting on these findings, Dr Eamon Keenan, National Clinical Lead, Addiction Services at the HSE said: "The survey has been a useful tool to capture emerging drug trends such as the current popularity of ketamine. These findings support what we are witnessing across festivals this summer, with ketamine appearing as the substance of choice, often used as part of a polysubstance pattern with stimulant drugs MDMA and cocaine."

Implementation Science Training Institute three-day training event: July 2022

The Implementation Science
Training Institute (ISTI) took
place at Nano Nagle Place
as part the activities of the
Health Implementation
Research Hub at UCC's
School of Public Health.

Twenty-four PhD students, researchers, academics, and practitioners from the Irish health service learned about the relatively new field of implementation research.

The **ISTI** is a blended training programme and participants had already completed online training modules.

From the 5th-7th of July, they participated in 3 days of in-person training including:

- Specialised presentations from leaders in the field on advanced topics such as equity and implementation science, mechanisms of action, and implementation trial design and measurement,
- Small group work and project feedback from expert facilitators,
- Peer and facilitator networking,
- Q&A with international experts, and
- Mentoring opportunities.

The training programme was facilitated by national and international experts in implementation science including Byron Powell, Rachel Shelton, Cara Lewis, Geoff Curran, Jeremy Grimshaw, Sheena McHugh, Michael Sykes, Jenny Mc Sharry as well as researchers from the Health Implementation Research Hub, Fiona Riordan and Susan Calnan. The course was ably coordinated by Tanya van der Water and Tania McCollum from the School of Public Health.

The **ISTI** is funded by the Health Research Board Research Leader Award held by Dr Sheena McHugh, Senior Lecturer at the School of Public Health and programme director.




New paper on associations between the nutrient profiling system underlying the Nutri-Score nutrition label and biomarkers of chronic low-grade inflammation published

Low-grade systemic inflammation is associated with a range of chronic conditions. Diet may modulate inflammation and public health strategies are needed to guide consumers' dietary choices and help prevent diet-related disease. Front-of-pack labelling is believed to be a key public health policy measure that could be implemented to promote healthy eating and prevent disease. The Nutri-Score labelling system, which uses five colours, is considered promising in a broad international context. Recent research, conducted by the School of Public Health (led by Dr Seán Millar and Dr Catherine Phillips), examined relationships between the Nutri-Score labelling system and a range of inflammatory biomarkers using data from Mitchelstown cohort study.

This research, which has been published in the journal Nutrients, found that higher Nutri-Scores, reflecting poorer nutritional quality, were consistently and positively associated with eight of the 14 examined biomarkers in crude and adjusted analyses. Studies which have investigated the impact of the Nutri-Score and its five categories on consumers' perceived healthiness perceptions and purchasing intentions, found that the presence of the Nutri-Score enabled respondents to better assess the healthiness of food products. Surveys carried out in France, Spain, Belgium and Germany have also shown that the Nutri-Score is perceived favourably by consumers and is the preferred format when compared to other nutrition labels tested. However, the authors of the present study noted that controversy exists regarding the Nutri-Score and its proposed adoption by the European Union Commission as a front-of-pack labelling system for European Union member states. Nevertheless, findings from the School of Public Health research and other studies suggest that the Nutri-Score labelling system may be an important tool to help consumers make more healthy food choices and also prevent inflammatory dysregulation and inflammatory-related disease.

New publication in the International Journal of Obesity

Dr Matvienko-Sikar and colleagues in **CRE EPOCH Translate**, recently published a core outcome set for childhood obesity prevention interventions in the International Journal of Obesity.

A core outcome set is a standardised set of minimum outcomes that should be measured in a particular health area to improve standardisation in that area, which can improve evidence syntheses and reduce research waste. Work is ongoing to determine how best to measure the core outcomes.

Associate Professor Bryon Powell delivers a seminar on Implementation Mapping!



On July 21st the Health Implementation Research Hub were delighted to host a seminar entitled "Implementation Mapping: An approach to selecting and tailoring implementation strategies", delivered by Bryon Powell.

Byron is an international expert in implementation science and faculty at the Brown School at Washington University in St Louis. Byron was visiting Ireland during July as a Fulbright Specialist. Overall, 27 people registered for the seminar, with over 20 attendees. Byron presented an introduction to the Implementation Mapping approach along with some practical examples, drawing on the Collaborative Organizational Approach to Selecting and Tailoring Implementation Strategies (COAST-IS) study.




Second Annual Suicide & Self-Harm Research Workshop

Congratulations to Dr Karen Matvienko-Sikar and Dr Monica O'Mullane (currently based in UCC's ISS21) who have both been awarded a prestigious Health Research Board (HRB) Emerging Investigator Award (EIA). The HRB Emerging Investigator Award supports talented individuals at a critical career transition stage to establish themselves as independent health investigators and to develop collaborative researchers who can facilitate actionable knowledge. Of 42 eligible applications to the 2022 EIA round, only 9 awards were made, and receipt of two of these awards by Dr

Matvienko-Sikar and Dr O'Mullane is a fantastic achievement for the School of Public Health.

Monica's project, HIA-IM, focuses on Health Impact Assessment (HIA), which is an established tool for analysing potentially detrimental health outcomes of policies, programmes and projects. HIA generates evidence on the distribution of health impacts across population groups, including groups traditionally marginalised and particularly vulnerable to policy changes. HIA-IM will capitalise on the synergy of recent policy drivers for HIA implementation, namely Healthy Ireland 2013-2025 and the Institute of Public Health HIA guidance (2021). The project will build a HIA implementation model in order to enhance intersectoral approaches in tackling health inequalities in policy development. This will be done by employing a hybrid implementation science framework using action research methodologies during the conduct of two HIAs, one on the national Climate Action Plan, the other on the local Cork City Development Plan. HIA-IM aims to strengthen intersectoral policy and practice in tackling health inequalities through the development of an enhanced HIA implementation model, as well as informing the national roll-out of the Institute of Public Health Ireland HIA programme.

Dr Matvienko-Sikar's research aims to provide researchers, practitioners, and policymakers with a toolkit of measurement instruments (e.g., questionnaires, clinical assessments) to better evaluate infant-feeding interventions and prevent childhood obesity. Childhood obesity is a critical public health issue, with one in four children currently experiencing overweight or obesity. Development of a standardised toolkit of measurement instruments, will address existing variability in the approaches and quality of how infant feeding is examined in childhood obesity prevention efforts. Dr Matvienko-Sikar will work with national and international experts in childhood obesity, infant feeding, measurement, knowledge translation, nutritional epidemiology, stakeholder engagement and evidence synthesis to achieve the project aims. The project outputs will enhance the evaluation of interventions to prevent childhood obesity, with potential for significant impact on, and meaningful improvements for, population health.

Dr Isabela Troya starts her recently awarded IRC government of Ireland 2-year fellowship for new study on self-harm and suicide in older people



Dr Isabela Troya, School of Public Health and National Suicide Research Foundation, University College Cork, has started this summer her recently awarded IRC Government of Ireland two-year Fellowship (2022-2024) for the study entitled "Examining individual and psychosocial determinants of self-harm and suicidality in older adults: improving risk assessment and management".

Annually in Ireland, more than 500 people die by suicide and more than 12,000 present to hospital following self-harm, of which 15% are older adults (aged >60 years of age). Older adults who self-harm are 20 times more likely to die from unnatural causes, and 67 times more likely to die by suicide when compared to their peers who have not self-harmed. Worldwide, the age group that is most likely to die by suicide is represented by older adults, in particular men. In addition, in Ireland, there is insufficient research into self-harm and suicide in older adults.

To gain a better understanding of self-harm in older adults, and to inform policy, patients, clinicians, and the Irish healthcare system, this research will address factors that lead to older adults harming themselves. Building on her award-winning PhD and postdoctoral research to date on self-harm in older adults, this research will address the risk factors and risk profile of older adults who self-harm. The research outcomes will impact self-harm clinical practice and policy in Ireland, which can be translated into international settings.

During her fellowship, Isabela will collaborate with colleagues at **The I**rish **L**ongitu**d**inal Study on **A**geing (**TILDA**) at Trinity College Dublin and continue to be involved with the National Suicide Research Foundation using the National Self-Harm Registry of Ireland. Aoibheann, who is starting her final year of the BSc Public Health Sciences this year, was a recipient of the HRB Summer Student Scholarship Award 2022.

Aoibheann undertook her 8-week scholarship under the supervision of Dr Fiona Riordan, working on a project entitled "The experiences of individuals living with diabetes during COVID-19: A photo voice project".

The project explored the experiences of individuals living with diabetes during COVID-19 and documents the impact of attending structured diabetes education programme, **Dose Adjustment for Normal Eating (DAfNE)**. The aim was to better

understand the benefits of such programmes and the process of adopting the programme principles in every-day life, particularly throughout the pandemic.

Photovoice is a community-based participatory approach, whereby participants take photographs of important and meaningful aspects of their lives and explain their significance. It was used in this project to offer an insight into the reality of living with diabetes during the pandemic. The project outputs will serve as a resource to raise awareness about diabetes management during COVID-19 and to highlight the role of education programmes like **DAfNE**.


