Commitment, Collaboration & Continuity: Celebrating Cork as a Healthy City

Inspired by the call of de Leeuw et al. (2021) for action to be dedicated to the assessment of work carried out across all Healthy Cities, a book has been published in response. *Commitment, Collaboration and Continuity: Celebrating Cork as a Healthy City* (ISBN: 978-1-9163790-8-4) is our response to the need for an assessment of work and reflexive examination of the processes, challenges, and successes for future development.



Chapters in the book share in a reflexive way the hard-earned experience and insight, lessons learned, and challenges faced and overcame, on projects led and/or partnered with Cork City, a WHO designated Healthy City since 2012. Such projects include Green Spaces for Health (chapter 11), PSYCHED - a mental health promotion initiative (chapter 8), establishing Ireland's first sexual health network (chapter 9), transforming the city through a playful approach (chapter 10), creating a food policy council in Cork (chapter 7), and community and voluntary sectoral partnership (chapter 6). Chapters are also included in the book on the future of public health and Cork Healthy Cities (chapter 2), public health history in Cork (chapter 3), Healthy Cities – a global movement working locally in Cork (chapter 4), the process of creating the Cork City Health Profile (chapter 5), and reflections on health in the climate emergency (chapter 12). The book was funded by Cork City Council, Cork Healthy Cities and ISS21 in UCC, and published by Cork City Libraries.





This book has been edited by Monica O'Mullane and Denise Cahill. FOODPATH-Europe launched in April in Utrecht, Netherlands

The FOOD systems and policy PATHways for equal population nutrition in Europe (FOODPATH-Europe) research programme was launched on 18th/19th April in Utrecht, the Netherlands. The overarching aim of FOODPATH is to identify and understand the societal, commercial and political determinants and mechanisms of food-related inequalities, and to provide solutions which have the potential to break through the cycles maintaining unhealthy dietary behaviours and foodrelated inequalities in Europe. It will take a broad perspective to investigate the factors which influence dietary behaviours among disadvantaged communities providing an understanding of how food policy, social policy and commercial interests could impact socioeconomic inequalities in diet. FOODPATH is a 3 year programme of work being led by Dr Janas Harrington, School of Public Health. It has partners in The Netherlands, Belgium, Poland Italy and Türkiye. It is funded under the ERA4Health (HealthEquity) Partnership.

SFI-IRC Pathway Programme 2024 Awardee

We are pleased to share that Dr Anvar Sadath was awarded an SFI-IRC Pathway grant for the research project: Long-TeRm impact of the COVID-19 pandEmic on self-hArm, suicide, and healTh care utilisation among people with high-risk Self-Harm and comorbidities: an interdisciplinary research programme [TREAT-SH], €452,139 over four years and including the allocation for one PhD Scholar.

Whilst the COVID-19 pandemic has led to an increase in a wide range of mental health distress and risk factors for suicidal behaviour, the longterm effects on self-harm and suicide are yet to be researched. TREAT-SH will address this via three work packages (WPs). WP1 will examine the 3-year impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on self-harm. WP2 will examine individual and system-related barriers influencing treatment and follow-ups. WP3 will investigate the long-term risk factors for suicide. By identifying the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on selfharm, TREAT-SH will enhance the assessment and treatment of selfharm, helping prevent suicide.



This grant has been awarded under the NSRF-UCC Memorandum of Collaboration.

UPDATES FROM THE NSRF

Launch of 2021 Registry Report

On February 13th, the National Self-Harm Registry Ireland published its most recent report covering the year 2021.

The National Self-Harm Registry Ireland reports:

- 12,661 self-harm presentations to hospital by 9,533 individuals in 2021
- A rate of 196 per 100,000 individuals presenting to hospital following self-harm in 2021, similar to the rate of 200 per 100,000 reported in 2020

Findings from the Annual Report 2021 showed:

• No increase in hospital-presenting selfharm during the 2nd year of the pandemic



World TB Day- 24th March

Tuberculosis (TB) – a neglected disease, is still one of the world's/ deadliest diseases. World TB Day, 24 March 2024, is an opportunity to renew commitment, inspire and take action to end TB. This year, the WHO campaign theme is 'Yes! We can end TB!'

Two recent publications were published by colleagues in SPH to coincide with the World TB Day, 2024. The first study was published in the journal Vaccine. In collaboration with Trinity College Dublin, Dr Zubair Kabir of UCC and his PhD student Ms Sarah Jackson of HPSC Ireland, argued the need for selective BCG vaccination in Ireland since the cessation of universal BCG vaccination in 2015. They emphasized the need for timely surveillance of paediatric TB cases to monitor for the emergence of increasing trends or emergent risk groups in the identified mainly unvaccinated population.

In another global study, published in the Lancet Infectious Disease, Dr Kabir – a coauthor on this paper – reported that the world did not attain the first interim milestones of the WHO End TB Strategy in 2020, despite accelerated progress in reducing the global burden of TB in the past decade. The study also indicated that countries must refine their national TB programs and recalibrate to achieve the 2035 TB targets for equal access across all age-groups.





The European Burden of Disease Conference in Trieste, Italy

On 14-15 March 2024, the European Burden of Disease Network held its second international burden of disease conference in Trieste, Italy. Dr Zubair Kabir is the lead researcher on this EU COST Action Network from Ireland, who attended this conference, along with two of his recent graduates. Megan Tumulty - an MPH graduate (Class 2022-2023) had an oral presentation on her MPH Dissertation entitled "A systematic review of the methodological considerations in Campylobacter burden of disease studies" - a UCC study in collaboration with Sciensano, Brussels.

"An Introduction to Open Research and tools that cannot support teaching and learning of Open Research" IN LOUGHBOROUGH UNIVERSITY, UK



Dr Karen Matvienko-Sikar recently delivered two invited talks on Open Research. The second talk was organised by the Department of Psychology and the Research & Graduate School in Mary Immaculate College in Limerick (March 2024), and was entitled "The what, why, and how of open research: An introduction".

In both talks Karen introduced what open research is, why it is important, and how to engage in open research practices. SoPH IN THE PRESS ----

A higher body mass index is significantly associated with worse mental health, a new SoPH study finds

Recent research conducted by Dr Caoimhe Lonergan, Dr Seán Millar and Dr Zubair Kabir from the UCC School of Public Health examined relationships between adiposity, defined using body mass index (BMI) and waist-height ratio, and depressive symptoms, assessed using the validated 20-item Centre for Epidemiologic Studies Depression Scale, in a random sample of 1,821 middle to older-aged adults from the Mitchelstown Cohort Study.

The research has been published in the journal PLOS One, showing significant linear relationships between increased adiposity and a greater number of depressive symptoms after adjustment for demographic characteristics, lifestyle factors and disease conditions. This relationship was more pronounced in females compared to males.

Several biological mechanisms are plausible linking increased adiposity with depression. However, the study authors note that increased weight may exacerbate depression through social means, such as prejudice, discrimination, and self and societal stigma. The chronic pain that is directly caused by obesity, such as joint pain, back pain and fibromyalgia, is also known to result in depression. This was a cross-sectional study, and it is possible that increased adiposity is a consequence of depressive symptoms, rather than a cause. Nevertheless, the authors suggest that targeted interventions for reducing depression should include better population-level weight management measures.

Commenting, Dr Seán Millar said "Although our research suggests that the relationship between adiposity and depressive symptoms is independent of potential confounders such smoking, alcohol use, low-level physical activity, poor diet and chronic conditions, future studies using prospective data, in diverse populations, are needed to confirm these findings. In addition, further research is required to identify the mechanisms which link overweight and obesity with depression."

The study has received considerable media attention and was also discussed on ABC news in the United States (<u>LINK</u>).

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
