Dr Eve Griffin, CEO, National Suicide Research Foundation



Eve is Chief Executive Officer at the National Suicide Research Foundation, Ireland. She has more than 12 years' experience in the area of suicide prevention. She has authored more than 60 scientific reports and peer-reviewed publications on the topic of self-harm and suicide, and has a strong track record of collaborating with partners in policy, service provision and clinical practice.

Professor Ella Arensman, Professor of Public Mental Health, School of Public Health, University College Cork and Chief Scientist, National Suicide Research Foundation



Ella is Head of School of Public Health, Professor of Public Mental Health, College of Medicine and Health and Chief Scientist with the National Suicide Research Foundation, University College Cork. Over more than 35 years, she has initiated numerous national and international interdisciplinary research consortia on suicide and self-harm surveillance, intervention and prevention programmes for suicide, self-harm, depression, anxiety, and excess mortality among young people and adults with mental health conditions.

Ms. Ailish O'Neill, National Education and Training Manager, HSE National Office for Suicide Prevention (NOSP)



Ailish is Education and Training Manager with the NOSP, focused on the implementation of Connecting for Life - Education and Training Plan. Ailish has worked with the HSE since 2018. Prior to taking on the role with NOSP, Ailish worked for 10 years in the area of Health Promotion across the voluntary sector in Ireland and the NHS in Scotland, focused on upstream mental health and wellbeing.

Aoife is a GP in UCC Student Health with 18 years of general practice experience. In addition to GP work she works with the UCC Mental Health and Wellbeing Team.
