Dr. Minna Valjakka is a researcher and an associate professor of art history at the University of Helsinki, Finland. Through locallyembedded research at the intersection of art studies, urban studies and environmental humanities, she examines various forms of urban creativity in relation to public spaces and civil society formation in East and Southeast Asian cities. Minna is a passionate researcher and has pursued to develop a multi-sited and comparative research through many years of ethnographic fieldwork and archival research in numerous locations across the region. She is mainly interested to examine how artistic and creative practices engage with the distinctive trajectories of contemporary arts, cultural politics, and translocal mediations. She has published extensively in a range of journals, edited volumes and museum catalogues. She is currently working on two major research projects, one of which focuses on redefinitions of (counter-)monumentality in East and Southeast Asia, and the other on environmentally engaged art and its planetary responsibilities.

#### URBAN ENCOUNTERS: RENEGOTIATING MEMORYSCAPES IN EAST AND SOUTHEAST ASIA. RESPONDENT: TATSUMA PADOAN (LECTURER IN EAST ASIAN RELIGIONS) UNIVERSITY COLLEGE CORK, C\_WW\_9 WEST

Around the world, artistic and creative interventions are renegotiating the historical narratives constructed through monuments, memorials, and institutions in urban environments. These often carefully composed 'memoryscapes' (Muzaini 2006, Muzaini and Yeoh, 2016, Davis 2013) relate not only to the colonial pasts and construction of imperialism, but also to the commemorations of wars and celebrations of national heroism. In addition to being the materialization of specific mnemopolitics, these sites and public artworks have inspired a variety of public interventions by contemporary artists, activists and citizens, and are therefore layered with shifting meanings and representations. Through selected case studies from Hong Kong and Singapore, I will show how contemporary artists, activists and citizens are redefining monumentality, with practices ranging from antagonistic attacks to officially commissioned modifications. While engaging with the formation of civil society, the (im)materiality of these urban encounters offers new insights into debates on the decolonization of art, public space, and activism.
