- A high level of intercultural competency.



- The capacity to identify the detail that matters.

GRADUATE OUTCOMES FOR FRENCH

UCC Career Services produces a Graduate Outcomes Report based on an annual survey of graduates six months after graduation. Last year, 96% of Arts graduates with French as a major or minor subject were in employment or further study. Students study French as a subject offered within a range of degrees including the Bachelor of Arts (BA), BCL Law and French and BComm with French. GRADUATE STUDIES

A degree in French is an excellent basis for further study. The School of Languages, Literatures and Cultures offers a range of taught postgraduate courses including the MA in Translation Studies, MA in Languages and Cultures and MA in Applied Linguistics. The department also offers research opportunities at postgraduate level including the MRes and a three-year PhD programme in French studies. Graduates of French at UCC have also gone on to pursue postgraduate qualifications abroad, at institutions such as the Collège d'Europe.

AREAS OF EMPLOYMENT FOR FRENCH GRADUATES



A degree in French opens doors to a range of sectors including media, journalism, education, diplomacy, international businesses organisations, NGOs and the cultural sector. Our graduates are independent individuals with excellent attention to detail, skills that many employers look for when recruiting. Some areas in which our graduates go on to work are listed below:

Graduates of French at UCC have held journalism positions in BBC Radio Four, the Irish Examiner, the Irish Independent and Bloomberg.

Many of our graduates pursue careers in business, working in international food companies and at organisations such as Google, Facebook and TransferWise.

Our students are now working in translation companies across Ireland and Europe, as well as in organisations such as the European Commission.



Gain relevant skills and experience through volunteering – find out more by attending the annual UCC volunteering fair.



Gain relevant skills and experience by taking an active role in a club/society that interests you, or the Student's Union.


