Medical Certificates


The Department supports students who have genuine difficulties and asks students to please be aware of and observe the following procedures:

Medical Certificates must be submitted to the administration office (ORB 2.50) or by emailing government@ucc.ie no later than two weeks after the date of examination/assessment deadline or approved assessment submission date. Flexibility will be allowed in exceptional circumstances that prevent submission within the two-week window.

A medical certificate should include the following details:

The name and address of the prescribing doctor, the date of the examination/GP visit, the date the certificate was issued specifying the date of return to study or identify a chronic/on-going condition, state the impact on the student's ability to attend lectures, tutorials, examinations/submit the relevant programme assessment(s), the student's name.
