Employers value Historians as they possess transferable skills. Historians are creative and critical thinkers who deliver on time. They:


- Formulate convincing and cogent arguments.
- Express themselves with coherence, clarity and fluency.
- Gather, organise and deploy diverse sources of evidence.
- Exercise self-discipline, self-direction and independent thought.
- Appreciate complexity and diversity of situations, events and mentalities.




- Adhere to rules of evidence with integrity and maturity.
- Use texts and a wide array of source materials critically.
- Command knowledge to contextualise and comprehend situations and problems.
- Understand how people have existed, acted and thought in context.
- Reflect critically on the nature of evidence and on theoretical underpinnings.
- Utilise ICT, retrieve information and present effectively.
- Respect others' reasoned views but subject them to critical analysis.
- Work collaboratively and participate effectively in group work.
- Show empathy and imaginative insight.
- Display initiative.

#### **GRADUATE STUDIES**

Your BA is inestimable. With it you can opt to specialise in a field of history or go into different professions with a conversion masters. For those who decide to continue in History, UCC offers taught masters in History, International Relations, Irish Revolution, Local History, Medieval History, Renaissance Latin Culture and Strategic Studies (online). These are designed with career needs in mind, and include work placements and practical training in combination with academic learning. History is also a key contributor to collaborative programmes: Irish Studies; Digital Arts and Humanities; Government and Politics; and Women's Studies. For those interested in research, the Department offers a two-year MPhil degree and a three-year PhD programme.

## AREAS OF EMPLOYMENT FOR HISTORY GRADUATES





Diplomat, Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade


Bob Patterson has covered a broad spectrum of foreign policy in the Department of Foreign Affairs. His assignments



included the Treaty of Nice, the European Convention on the Future of Europe, which led to the Treaty of Lisbon, disarmament and non-proliferation, including the Arms Trade Treaty adopted in 2012, and security including counter-terrorism. He was Deputy Director for International Security Policy. Overseas assignments included the United Kingdom, Nigeria and Vietnam, where he served as Deputy Ambassador, South Africa, where he managed Ireland's development assistance programmes, and Nigeria, as Chargé d'Affaires.

Tom Lonergan is a Senior Archivist. He entered UCC as a mature student 2012. He has worked in the Military Archives in Rathmines, the National








## 8 WAYS TO PUT YOUR HISTORY DEGREE TO WORK


Get involved in the Students' Union or a club/society that interests you.




Gain relevant paid/voluntary work experience during holidays.









Sign up for training courses that will strengthen your skillset, e.g. languages, ECDL.




Set up a LinkedIn profile and start building your network.




