

History is committed to delivering as much on-campus, face-to-face teaching as possible in 2020/21. In the current situation that will result in a blended student experience to comply with government and public health guidelines and to ensure the safety of both our students and staff. Attendance at many core lectures and optional modules will be staggered into pods, and rotas for attendance for each pod will be developed once students have registered for the modules. All lectures will be recorded for immuno-compromised, DSS registered students and non-attending pods, and will be available via Canvas.

This means students will engage in both online learning (live online events and pre-made online content) and on-campus learning (in-person sessions at UCC).

Full delivery information will be available once you register for your subjects/modules and access Canvas.

It is important for students to note that it is imperative that they have access to good quality broadband and appropriate IT equipment to allow them to participate in online and blended classes, and that they are able to attend UCC campus to attend in-person on-campus lectures.

Lectures and other online and on-campus learning activities commence for most programmes on **Monday, 28th September**. Teaching Description Definitions:

Hybrid lectures: socially distanced on-campus lectures (face-to-face / in person). Attendance at lectures and optional modules will be staggered into pods, and rotas for attendance for each pod will be developed. All lectures will be recorded for immuno-compromised, DSS registered students and non-attending pods, and will be available via Canvas.

Online: a structured and integrated combination of live online events and pre-made online content (e.g., reading activities, recordings, short PowerPoints). If circumstances permit these may be supplemented by some small group in-person, on campus activities.
