All countries are struggling to provide high quality, safe and effective healthcare at an affordable cost. Ireland is not alone!



PROFESSOR HENRY SMITHSON



Henry Smithson has recently taken up the position of Professor of General Practice within the Department of General Practice in UCC. He brings experience gained through over twenty five years in clinical practice in both rural and urban settings and from the development of networks of research practices in the UK. He is a keen observer of the unintended consequences of health service reform, particularly in the UK and hopes to provide evidence to inform the changes being considered in Ireland. He moved to Cork because of the strength of general practice locally and the opportunities offered by joining an expanding university department.

Coming from general practice, it is not surprising that he has worked on a broad clinical range of studies including asthma, diabetes, incontinence of urine, vit D supplementation in infants and medicines adherence but his particular interest is in how people manage their long term conditions with epilepsy as the main exemplar. He is also working with the Irish charity Epilepsy Ireland to set up a national registry of epilepsy related death reported by families, doctors, nurses and coroners. The objective is to better understand the behavioural circumstances leading up to death. There is an opportunity to work with the National Register of Suicide and Self Harm to consider extending the reach of the registries to general practice.

General practice is a rich teaching environment with many committed tutors in a variety of premises with the practices offering a wide choice of clinical experience in settings that offer a range of health care. Students can gain invaluable clinical experience dealing with multi-morbidity, behavioural aspects of medicine and medicines management. With increasing sub-specialisation in hospital practice, general practice presents students with a rare opportunity to see the bio-psycho-social aspects of general medical practice across a range of ages and conditions.

Una was recently awarded the Dental Health Foundation sponsored International Association of Dental Research (IADR), Irish Division Public Dental Health and Health Promotion Prize, based on her MDPH dissertation.

Dr Gillian Leonard is working with the HSE in County Meath, Gillian focused on oral health preventive programmes for pre-school children and the training requirements of public health nurses and speech and language therapists in promoting oral health. Gillian is not only a Master but also became a very proud Mum during the programme.



Pharmacy student wins UCC's inaugural Global eHealth Scholarship

Laura Daly, a 2nd year pharmacy student from Fermoy, has won UCC's inaugural Global eHealth Scholarship for a concept that will come as a welcome boost in the fight against malaria.

Miss Daly was awarded the scholarship for a research project that sought to use mobile technology to collect data on paediatric malarial medication in Africa and to use this dataset to predict future areas of malarial drug resistance. Laura will receive €1,000 in funding to implement her idea by participating in a large EU-funded mobile health research project called 'Supporting LIFE' currently underway in Malawi, Africa. She will get to work with a large multidisciplinary team of researchers from the Department of Accounting, Finance and Information Systems at UCC, the University of Oxford, Lund University, Sweden and Mzuzu University, Malawi.

CF Matters presents 8 abstracts at National CF Conference

The Cystic Fibrosis Research Team from UCC/Cork University Hospital presented a total of 8 abstracts (6 posters and 2 oral presentations) at the recent National Cystic Fibrosis Conference in Killarney.

Dr Grace O'Callaghan

Dr Grace O'Callaghan was awarded 1st place in the Basic Research Category, for her work 'Investigation of the interplay of the Cystic Fibrosis lung-gut axis in the regulation of inflammation of intestinal epithelial cells'. This work showed that the Inflammatory changes in the CF lung can increase pro-inflammatory cytokine production in the gut. This mechanism may regulate intestinal inflammation independent of active CF lung infection. The research was supervised by Professor Barry Plant and funded by the FP7 Project CFMATTERS under grant agreement n°603038.

Stephanie English

I have always enjoyed the concept of research, that you can perhaps contribute in some way to a bigger picture that interests you. Ever since my first research experiences in undergraduate Biomedical Health Sciences, I have been keen to gain new skills in research and learn the ropes. One of many areas that has always fascinated me is Cystic Fibrosis, a well-known disease in Ireland with a well-established clinical picture. However, the demography of patients with CF is changing and with newfound

longevity comes the reality of novel, poorly understood extra-pulmonary co-morbidities. These complications hold marked significance to the CF disease burden and interest me greatly.

Over the past year, I am grateful to have established on-going research in the area of Cystic Fibrosis related Acute Kidney Injury, as the latter becomes an emerging reality in the ongoing CF disease process. This research has been enthusiastically supported and cultivated by the Departments of Renal and Respiratory medicine at CUH, notably Dr Liam Plant and Dr Barry Plant. Our research was recognised at the recent National Cystic Fibrosis Meeting in Killarney this year and we are excited to take our findings for oral presentation at the European CF Meeting in Gothenburg, Sweden this coming June. The UCC School of Medicine has also contributed greatly to this research, affording me a Summer Undergraduate Research Award in 2013 which fuelled interest in the nascent project. I would like to thank the School of Medicine and Research Committee, and specifically Dr Colm O' Tuathaigh, for their invaluable research guidance and travel bursaries over the past year.

Finally, I would advise any student with a keen interest in research to sow the seed early and get affiliated with an area that interests you. There is so much to gain and learn on a multitude of levels.

The Impact of Stillbirth on Consultant Obstetrician Gynaecologists



The first research study into the impact of stillbirth on Consultant Obstetricians has recently been published in BJOG: An International Journal of Obstetrics and Gynaecology. This study was carried out by Mr Daniel Nuzum & Dr Keelin O'Donoghue based in the Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology, UCC at Cork University Maternity Hospital. This study highlights that it is time to acknowledge the human and professional impact of stillbirth on Consultants. It reveals a very human insight into the personal burden of stillbirth. It also highlights awareness on the part of consultants of what bereaved parents experience when faced with this tragedy.

AUDGPI Annual Scientific Meeting

Association of University Departments of General Practice in Ireland (AUDGPI) Annual Scientific Meeting was held at the Western Gateway Building, UCC.

The 2014 meeting was the Association's 16th scientific conference and saw close to 100 delegates attending.

The meeting was addressed by Minister Alex White, Minister for State, Department of Health & Children with responsibility for Primary Care as well as Professor Bob Bollinger Head of the Centre for Global Health Education at Johns Hopkins Medical School.

There were 50 scientific papers presented and approx. 40 posters. Topics addressed included cardiovascular disease; diabetes; child health; healthcare of the elderly; prescribing; clinical decision making; and the patient's perspective. There was also sessions relating to education at all levels from second level (schools) to the continuing professional development of general practitioners. The workshops included using data from GP clinical information systems for research; career structures; online learning for health professionals; and evidence based medicine.

'It's a Beautiful World' Exhibition


