

Dear Colleagues,

Welcome to the summer edition of the College of Medicine and Health's newsletter.

As you can see from this bumper edition, there is a lot happening in our Schools and Research Centres. Our newsletter is bursting at the seams with awards, achievements and recent events from all across the College. As our student population takes a well-deserved break, our staff have the opportunity to take stock, plan new initiatives, write up research results and plan new grants, these are year round activities but the summer time gives a tremendous opportunity to gain ground!

This June saw the graduation of 180 undergraduate and postgraduate students from across our six schools while May saw the graduation of 200 medical students. Graduation days are the proudest days in the college calendar as students, staff, families and friends join in a celebration of achievement. As a College, we are proud of each and every one of our students and now we are proud of you, as graduates. I hope that you will take this pride and carry it with you as you develop as healthcare professionals.

This issue also highlights a number of significant developments around the College such as the opening of the new Dental Hub in the Dental School and Hospital, the hub is an innovative way of presenting learning spaces and has been well received by our students. The Paediatric Academic Unit located in Cork University Hospital was also opened in June by the Tánaiste Simon Coveney.

These brand new facilities are testament to our desire to expand and advance as a College as well as to the determination and hard work of our staff in realising these projects.

Our larger scale projects which are funded by EIB loans are also gaining traction as the Design brief for the €37M new Dental School and Hospital in Curraheen has been awarded. Discussions on the Clinical Medical School development on the CUH site are also well advanced and it is expected that we will turn the sod on the Health Innovation Hub building in Curraheen before the end of the year.

Our College's ambitious development plans are to be supported by three new Vice Dean roles in the College: Vice Dean for Research & Innovation (FTE 0.2), Vice Dean for Clinical & Strategic Partnerships (FTE 0.2), Vice Dean for Graduate Studies & Inter-professional Learning (FTE 0.4).

These posts will lead a step change in research, partnership and graduate activity within the College. The roles will be filled by internal competition from among the academic staff in the College and the appointments will be for three years. I look forward to working with colleagues in these new roles as we lead the College towards the vision of an Academic Health Centre model with our SSWHG partners. We can look forward to a lot of new beginnings in the academic year ahead as our new Deans of Medicine, Professor Paula O'Leary and Nursing and Midwifery, Professor Josephine Hegarty take up their roles. September also sees the further cementing of our partnership with University Hospital Waterford with the appointment of Dr Peter Neary and

Dr May Clarke as Professors in Colorectal Surgery and Orthopaedics respectively, both take up their posts in September, they will join with our other UCC staff in Waterford in strengthening our academic base.

The new academic year will also see the launch of our crowd sourcing initiative to develop our new strategy in the College. Following a tender process we have commissioned a company called Clever Together www.clevertogether.com/web/ to work with us in engaging all our staff, affiliates and stakeholders to have their say on the future of the College. According to Clever Together "half of the best ideas lie within the 80% of people who normally don't contribute". Through the bespoke web based platform to be developed by Clever Together, we seek to identify the most insightful, valuable and impactful contributions from our stakeholders. We will work with the collective insights that such interactions will bring to develop a well-informed, well supported strategy that is easy to implement. You can expect more on this in September.

Meanwhile, may I wish you all a refreshing and relaxing summer break, I hope you enjoy the super weather, it is 28°C as I write; stay cool, stay safe and wear sunscreen!

Athena Swan Bronze Award for School of Pharmacy



Congratulations to the School of Pharmacy who were awarded an Athena SWAN Bronze Award in acknowledgment of its demonstrated commitment to promote the advancement of STEM careers for women in higher education.

The School of Pharmacy, along with the Schools of Chemistry and Biological Environment and Earth Sciences, are the first recipients of the Departmental/School award in UCC, following the University's institutional award in 2016.

The Athena Swan self-assessment process has provided the School with a structured framework to identify areas of action and implementation. The key action the School will implement over the next 3 years is aimed at supporting the career trajectory of female academics and research staff.

SFI INFANT Research Centre secures funding of €570,000

The INFANT Centre at University College Cork, has been awarded €570,000 by global charitable foundation Wellcome Trust, to develop a smart brain monitoring system for new-borns that may have brain injury. Named 'Delphi', the new system will help to detect the severity of brain damage as soon as possible enabling early intervention and appropriate therapies tailored to each individual baby.

Brain injury at birth, potentially due to lack of oxygen or blood supply to the brain, sepsis and other conditions, can leave newborns with permanent disabilities such as cerebral palsy, epilepsy or learning difficulties. Early detection of neonatal brain injury can be vital to improve outcomes and reduce the impact of the brain damage. While vital signs such as heart rate, respiration, temperature and blood pressure are monitored closely when newborns are in neonatal intensive care (NICU), electrical monitoring (EEG) is not routinely available due to its complexity and the need for expert interpretation.

Geraldine Boylan, INFANT Centre Director and Professor of Neonatal Physiology said, "This award by Wellcome Trust acknowledges the calibre of research capability and global impact of the work that we are doing at INFANT. We are delighted to partner with the Wellcome Trust on this two year research project, which will undoubtedly have enormous impact on newborn brain health research and provide a new and 'smart' way of monitoring the brains of newborns so the earliest and most appropriate treatment can be delivered."

John J Ryan Distinguished Lecture **Award for Professor Fergus Shanahan**

Professor Shanahan delivered the John J Ryan Distinguished Lecture at RCSI Research Day 2018 titled 'Translating Microbiome Science'. The John J Ryan Distinguished Lecture award recognises a scientist who has made major contributions to developing innovative biomedical technologies with the potential to have a broad impact on the life sciences.

RCSI's annual Research Day provides scientists with the opportunity to showcase their most recent research findings. The latest advances in biomedical sciences, clinical research, population health

sciences, healthcare delivery and health professions education are just some of the topics featured in studies were presented to more than 300 researchers.

"I am honoured to accept this medal and am delighted to share APC's research in translating microbiome science" said Professor Shanahan. "APC Microbiome Ireland has been a magnet for foreign direct investment, doubling taxpayers' research investment, including nine international companies that would never have had a footprint in Ireland were it not for the existence of the APC."

The award consists of a stipend and provides support for enabling the research and teaching that the award recipient has designed. Dennis' first research project focuses on the care of the medical patient as he or she transitions from presentation at the emergency department to arrival on the medicine ward and his second project looks at antihypertensive medication adherence.


Honorary Doctorate Awarded to Professor John Cryan

Congratulations to Professor John F. Cryan who has been awarded an honorary degree in Pharmaceutical, Biomedical and Veterinary Sciences by the University of Antwerp. Professor Jean-Pierre Timmermans delivered the Laudation at the conferring ceremony.

In total five eminent scientists received honorary doctorates, including Professor Jeffery Sachs, Columbia University, New York and world renowned American economist, Professor Laurajane Smith, Australian National University, Professor Upendra Baxi, University of Warwick and Professor Michael D. Slater, Ohio State University.

The award recognises John's research on the interaction between the brain, the gut and the microbiome and how this relates to stress and immune or psychological disorders.

The ceremony was preceded by Masterclasses led by the honorary doctors. John's Masterclass was titled "Gut Feelings" - The Microbiota-Gut-Brain Axis in Physiology and Behaviour".

Ireland's first integrated paediatric academic unit opens

The first integrated paediatric academic unit in Ireland was officially opened on Monday 18th June by Minister for Foreign Affairs Simon Coveney, T.D. Following a multi-million euro investment by University College Cork, Science Foundation Ireland and a generous philantrophic donation, the new unit is located in an exceptional tri-location between Cork University Hospital, Cork University Maternity Hospital and University College Cork.

The first of its kind in Ireland, the new paediatric academic unit focuses on improving health outcomes for children, from infancy through to adolescence through teaching, research and innovation. Home to more than 60 staff, including clinical and academic leaders, scientists, nursing staff and PhD researchers: the academic teams tackle clinical problems such as newborn brain injury, infant seizures, allergy, eczema, sleep, and explore

ways of enhancing the long-term wellbeing and development of children.

"The development of clinical research infrastructure and research studies for children and infants is absolutely vital and will result in better outcomes for Irish children. Recruitment and retention of patients to clinical studies here in Cork leads the way in Europe. We are incredibly grateful to the Irish families who participate in our research and would like to take this opportunity to thank them sincerely for their dedication and support." said Geraldine Boylan, Co-Founder and Director of the INFANT Research Centre and UCC Professor of Neonatal Physiology. "We would also like to sincerely acknowledge the support of the College of Medicine & Health, UCC Central Research Support Services for all of their assistance and ongoing support, and our colleagues in the Clinical Research Facility-Cork."

NPEC Study Day

The National Perinatal Epidemiology Centre (NPEC) recently hosted its annual Study Day in the Limerick Strand Hotel. The theme of the NPEC Study Day 2018 was Neonatal Care in Ireland. The morning session consisted of presentations on the Very Low Birth Weight Infants Audit, Mid-Trimester Prolonged Rupture of Membranes Audit, Periviability, Therapeutic Hypothermia Audit and the Maternal & Newborn Clinical Management System. The morning session showcased the collaborative approach that has evolved within the Irish maternity services to translate clinical audit data and epidemiological evidence into improved maternity care for families in Ireland.

The NPEC were delighted to welcome Professor Neil Marlow, Professor of Neonatal Medicine at University College London as the keynote speaker. Professor Marlow presented information on "What makes the difference for the extremely preterm baby?". This was followed by a panel discussion in which representatives discussed "Perinatal Networks in Ireland – Is a different model required?"

SOP PhD student Elaine Enright awarded Fulbright Scholarship

Elaine was one of the 37 recipients of the Fulbright Irish Awardees for 2018-2019. Recipients were recently presented with Awards at a Ceremony in the U.S. Ambassadors Residence, Phoenix Park.

Students, academics and professionals from 13 HEIs in Ireland and Europe will go to 33 leading U.S. institutions to study and collaborate with experts in their fields. This year's Fulbright recipients are from diverse disciplines spanning science, languages, technology, medicine, literature and the



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Abstract of Distinction Award for Dr Éilis O'Reilly

Dr Éilis O'Reilly's (School of Public Health) abstract **Pre-diagnostic Plasma Polyunsaturated Fatty Acids** and the Risk of Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (EJ O'Reilly et al.), was chosen for a platform presentation, and was among 24 selected as 2018 Abstracts of Distinction from the 3000+ submissions, at the 70th American Academy of Neurology Annual Meeting held in Los Angeles.

Dr Éilis O'Reilly joined School of Public Health last year from Harvard University where she obtained her joint doctorate in nutrition and epidemiology methods and served as junior faculty, proctor, and member of the board of freshman advisors.

Among her areas of interest are methodological issues in epidemiology and neuroepidemiology, and her publications on the association between diet and environmental exposures and neurological outcomes are widely cited. Funded by an NIH-R01, Dr O'Reilly established a consortium of 10 international cohorts to investigate the epidemiology of motor neuron disease. In December, she was awarded €270,000 funding from the EPA, with co-PIs Dr Claire Buckley and Dr Stig Hellebust, to evaluate the available data on air quality and health outcomes in Ireland and to assess the feasibility of linking these data domains.

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

BOOK LAUNCH **B-BEST START** book for parents

The B-BEST START LifeMatters for Mums, Dads and New Born Babies handbook by author Dr Margaret O'Rourke, was launched on Friday, 11th May.

The B-BEST START Programme is part of the Infant Centre's NeoView Programme, which aims to improve the outcomes of babies in the neonatal unit (NNU) by empowering parents to build their own health, wellbeing and resilience so that they can be active, informed and emotionally engaged with their new born babies, infants and children.

Speaking at the event, Dr O'Rourke noted that the book helps to empower parents. "Babies need their mums and

dads, and the programme is about making them central to their baby's care. Babies can't wait: the first 1000 days of their lives are absolutely critical for their future development, and this book helps parents to cope and do the best for their babies."

The handbook offers an opportunity to make a difference to the next generation: the first three years of life (or first 1000 days) are critical to long-term outcomes, as the brain is rapidly developing and building its architecture. Early experiences on the developing brain are hugely important, particularly the relationship and caregiving from parents.



Family members bereaved by suicide have elevated levels of depression, anxiety and stress, and are at increased risk of adverse physical health conditions, said Professor Ella Arensman, after the publication of new NSRF-UCC research.

"This research underlines the importance of increasing awareness among health and mental health professionals to prioritise assessment and early identification of mental health and physical health problems among people bereaved by suicide."

The new research, conducted by the National Suicide Research Foundation (NSRF) and the School of Public Health, UCC, comprised a systematic review of 24 studies worldwide and in-depth interviews with 18 family members bereaved by suicide in Ireland.

Of family members bereaved by suicide, 24%, 18% and 27% had elevated levels of depression, anxiety and stress, respectively, a new study has shown. They also experienced other psychological problems including panic attacks, suicidal thoughts, intrusive images, nightmares and post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD).

Ailbhe Spillane, who conducted the research, said: "Since we now know the main physical and mental health problems experienced after suicide bereavement, we need to prioritise high-quality support services, without restricting such services because of financial constraints."



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In Memory



Born in Pudsey in Yorkshire in 1934, where his Cork-born father was a general practitioner, Michael Hyland was very proud of his Yorkshire roots. His childhood in Yorkshire was interrupted by World War 2, which was spent with his relatives in Cork, with holidays in Ballycotton, a place that always remained close to his heart. The family went back to Yorkshire in 1944, only to return to live permanently in Cork in 1948 where he and his siblings completed their school years. He went to UCC qualifying in medicine in 1957.

Geriatric medicine was emerging as a new clinical specialty in the UK in the 1950s. Michael received most of his postgraduate geriatric training in London in the 1960s. He was fortunate in having outstanding and highly respected figures as mentors,

including geriatricians Dr Jimmy Williams at the West Middlesex Hospital and Professor Gordon Mills at the Central Middlesex Hospital. It was in this latter hospital that he met his wife Rosaleen - they married in 1969.

When appointed as consultant geriatrician at St. Finbarr's Hospital in Cork in 1969, Michael was only the second specialist geriatrician in the Republic of Ireland, the other being Dr Jack Flanagan in St. James's Hospital, Dublin. With characteristic energy, efficiency and geniality, Michael set up the new specialist service in Cork, supported by Professor Denis O'Sullivan who was simultaneously developing a highly modernized UCC Department of Clinical Medicine at St. Finbarr's. Professor O'Sullivan understood the need for specialised geriatric medicine in Cork and guickly capitalised on Michael's talent as a skilled clinician and teacher. Within 7 years, Michael had established a thriving department, encompassing all the elements of a thoroughly modern geriatric medicine service, including Ireland's very first purpose-built older persons' rehabilitation unit, which opened in 1976. The acute geriatric medicine unit transferred to the new Cork Regional Hospital when it opened in 1978 and the department advanced steadily, ably assisted by Michael's first specialist colleague, Cillian Twomey, appointed in 1979.

Over the following two decades until his retirement from clinical practice, Michael was at the forefront of older person service development locally and nationally. This was during a time of contraction of hospital services nationally in the midst of a struggling Irish economy for most of those years. He served on the Working Party on Services for the Elderly from 1987-8, which produced the highly influential "The Years Ahead" report. This report had a major influence on the delivery of hospital and community medical and social services for older people. The following decade saw the establishment of specialist departments of geriatric medicine in virtually all of the nation's public hospitals. In 1978 the country was served by five geriatricians; the number today exceeds 100, many of whom were attracted to the specialty by Michael's qualities of service, clinical teaching and his selfless commitment to patients.

Michael received many honours in recognition of his outstanding contributions to geriatric medicine, including the British Geriatric Society's Presidential Medal in 1998, an honorary doctorate from UCC in 2008 and the Irish Gerontological Society Presidential Medal in 2012. He served as President of the Irish Gerontological Society from 1994 to 1998. He played a key role in

PROSPER, the first large scale clinical drug trial undertaken specifically in older people by researchers in three universities i.e. Leiden, Glasgow and UCC. The PROSPER trial results were published in The Lancet in 2002 and showed that statin drugs were just as beneficial in older people as younger people for prevention of heart disease. Following his retirement in 1998 until 2012, Michael served as chairman of the UCC-affiliated hospitals Clinical Research Ethics Committee (CREC). The committee acquired an enviable reputation for speed and efficiency under his direction which greatly facilitated a burgeoning local and national medical research community.

Among his few concessions to leisure were his love of opera and classical music (Wagner, Mahler, Richard Strauss, Bruckner among others), hill walking, gardening and visits to his beloved Ballycotton. In the midst of his busy professional life, Michael remained a highly committed family man. Michael's final illness brought him back to the department he had established in St. Finbarr's where he was lovingly nursed during his final year. He is survived by his wife Rosaleen, daughters Rachel and Lucy, son Peter. brother John and sisters Sheila and Bridget. He is predeceased by his daughter Emma.
