



Employment-based MD Scholarship Programme for Health Science Professionals in the Bon Secours Hospital

Guidelines

The School of Medicine at University College Cork (UCC) and the Bon Secours Hospital in Cork are pleased to announce a new partnership to provide an opportunity for registered post basic speciality training Medical Doctors either on a SpR training programme or with Registrar level experience to conduct MD research whilst in employment. In line with [UCC's Strategic Plan 2023-2028](#) the remit of the Employment-based MD Scholarship Programme is to enhance and sustain excellence in graduate education in healthcare and health sciences, to deepen collaboration between researchers and clinicians and to develop pathways to widen access to programmes. Projects will be anchored in or across one of the four primary [UCC Futures](#) research themes in the College of Medicine and Health (CoMH): Food Microbiome and Health, Children, Ageing and Brain Science, Medicines.

The Scholarship Programme is open to those who are registered to practice Medicine in Ireland either in specialist training schemes or practicing at Registrar level in the Irish healthcare system. Integral to the role is a requirement to be employed as a medical officer by Bon Secours Hospital in Cork (details as outlined by BSH).

Two scholarships will be offered to commence in July 2025 for a 24-month period.

- Scholarships will fund MD salary, annual MD registration fees and may contribute to associated research costs following application.
- Candidates must register for a minimum of 2 full years.
- The MD candidate will remain a salaried employee at the Bon Secours Hospital in Cork and will concurrently register as an MD student at UCC for the duration of the MD project¹.

Eligibility

Applicant

- An employee (full time/part time) employed as SpR / registrar in the Bon Secours Hospital in Cork.
- Registered on the general or trainee register of the Irish Medical Council.
- Have obtained a standard of at least Second Class Honours, Grade I, in an approved primary degree of Medicine, or possess relevant professional and clinical experience to allow them to be considered under the University's policy for [Recognition of Prior Learning for Admission to Research Degrees](#).
- Meet the [English language requirements for admission onto postgraduate programmes](#) in UCC.

Supervisory team¹

- Each supervisory team will have a minimum of two supervisors as follows and as per UCC policy on the [Supervision of Research Students](#):
 - The lead supervisor should be a member of the academic staff of the School of Medicine, UCC for the duration of the project.
 - A clinical co-supervisor should be a medical consultant of the Bon Secours Hospital, Cork, who must confirm agreement with the supervision principles of UCC¹.
- Should host a research programme relevant to the area in the proposed MD project.
- Additional co-supervisors from UCC academic or research staff or from research active Bon Secours Hospital staff are permitted and must abide by the supervision principles of UCC.

If necessary, there may be a contribution to the eligible research costs following application:

- Contribution to the cost of consumables & materials required to complete the project
- Access costs for specialised equipment usage
- Costs of access to technical support

The following costs will not be covered:

- Salary costs of any personnel associated with the project
- Travel costs associated with the project or dissemination of the results
- Overheads or indirect costs

How to Apply

Prior to applying for an MD Scholarship for Health Science Professionals, the applicant must arrange the following:

- Identify a clinical supervisor in the Bon Secours Hospital.
- Identify an academic (lead) supervisor from a Department/Research Centre in the School of Medicine at UCC who has similar or complementary research expertise.
 - The academic/clinical supervisor may identify additional supervisors in consultation with the candidate to ensure that the relevant expertise is in place for the proposed MD project.
- Consult with the supervisory team to identify a research project of priority and aligned with one of the UCC Futures research themes in UCC.

Once the supervisory team has been established, and a project agreed, a candidate may apply for the MD Scholarship.

- Part A should be completed by the applicant in consultation with the supervisory team.
- Part B should be completed by the supervisory team.
- Evidence of qualifications and final examination grades must be submitted with the application.
- The completed application form together with evidence of qualifications should be compiled as **one document in pdf format** and emailed to gradschoolmh@ucc.ie
- Applications that do not adhere to these requirements will not be considered.

The deadline for submission of the application is **5pm on Friday 28th March 2025**.

Selection

Applications will be assessed by the College of Medicine and Health Graduate Studies Committee based on the following:

- Scientific excellence and impact of the MD project (0-50 marks).
 - justification for the study in line with the relevant UCC Futures research themes (Food Microbiome and Health, Child, Ageing and Brain Science, or Medicines), hypothesis, aims, research design and methods, impact.
- Workplace and research experience of the applicant relevant to the proposed MD (0-10 marks).
- Applicant personal statement (0-10 marks).
- Supervisory team (0-10 marks).
- MD training and support structures (0-10 marks).
- Partnership between UCC and the Bon Secours Hospital (0-10 marks).
