Prof. Ella Arensman

Head of School of Public Health

What was the highlight at School of Public Health, UCC this year & why?

Over the past year, we have seen a significant increase in the number of students interested in Public Health, with the Masters in Public Health attracting students from all continents. Whilst this is overall a positive development, there are implications for the staff's workload, which we have started to address proactively and systematically.

From a research and development perspective. staff members of the School of Public Health have demonstrated extraordinary achievements in successful research grants at both national and international and at both early, mid-career and senior level, which is a very encouraging development in terms of both research quality and leadership in Public Health and Public Mental Health.

What are you looking forward to next year?

Resolving any outstanding capacity and workload related issues at both teaching and research level and addressing key priorities that staff members agreed upon at the School's Strategic Away Day last June, by 'moving from discussion to action'.

I also look forward to increased incorporation of Public Health's methodological expertise across the UCC Futures areas.







Five post-doctoral researchers at UCC's School of Public Health have received a total of €1.9 million in funding to investigate and find solutions for public health challenges.

High blood pressure during pregnancy. strategies for preventing drug overdose and the factors associated with suicide risk in older adults are among the health and social care research projects to receive funding from the Health Research Board's Postdoctoral Fellowship Scheme.

The five funded post-doctoral researchers are:

- **Dr Susan Calnan:** Improving public health through better implementation of alcohol policy: A multimethod study examining and addressing the factors influencing successful implementation. This research will provide evidence to help policymakers and stakeholders to better understand factors that influence the successful implementation of public health alcohol policy and look at ways to improve these factors so that alcohol policies are effectively implemented to help reduce harms from alcohol.
- **Dr Caroline Dalv:** RESTRICT -REducing intentional overdose: a mixed methods STudy of means RestrICTion interventions. Submitted under the National Suicide Research Foundation

- UCC Memorandum of Collaboration. this research aims to prevent intentional overdose by studying the impact of measures to restrict access to drugs. Delivered by a team of individuals from different disciplines including mental health professionals, policy makers, researchers and people with experiences of self-harm, findings from this research will provide a comprehensive understanding of intentional overdose in Ireland and inform future measures to restrict access to drugs and to prevent self-harm and suicide.
- Dr Fiona Riordan: Identifying social determinants and mapping organisational and personal networks to enhance community support for people living with multimorbidity. With people from disadvantaged communities developing chronic health conditions earlier in life. this project aims to find ways to better support people living with multiple conditions within disadvantaged areas in Ireland, and discuss the findings with a range of stakeholders, including policymakers, healthcare managers and representatives from non-clinical community services.
- **Dr Isabela Troya:** Revisiting suicide prevention in later life: human-centred approaches in an

- ageing Ireland. Annually in Ireland. over 400 people die by suicide and a further 12,000 are hospitalised following self-harm, of which 15% are older adults. The aim of this study is to improve the understanding of factors associated with self-harm and suicide risk in older adults. aged >60 and thus co-produce clinical and policy guidance to reduce suicidal behaviour in older adults. Submitted under the National Suicide Research Foundation - UCC Memorandum of Collaboration, this research should help strengthen and inform national suicide prevention strategies.
- **Dr Peter Barrett:** An investigation of the long-term impact of hypertensive disorders of pregnancy on maternal health, and exploration of optimal models of follow-up care for affected women in Ireland. This research will answer some of the uncertainties regarding long-term risks following high blood pressure during pregnancy, using existing large-scale datasets of over 2 million mothers in Sweden and follow their progress post pregnancy for up to 48 years.

Scale-Up4Rehab Project at **School of Clinical Therapies**

Our School of Clinical Therapies saw the launch of the Scale-Up4Rehab project which represents a major advance in the digitalization of rehabilitation across Europe. Dr Joseph McVeigh, Head of Discipline of Physiotherapy and Mr David Murphy from School of Computer Science & Information Technology at UCC were partners in a successful Interreg North-West Europe (NWE) grant with a total budget of €10.8 million across 13 European partners. The Scale-Up4Rehab project aims to develop an open NWE virtual rehabilitation 'clinic' similar in design to platforms such as Netflix, through which existing virtual rehabilitation therapies will be piloted and scaled-up. The goal is to provide a platform that offers access to virtual rehabilitation therapies for those in need.

Congratulations to the 14 UCC researchers featured in the Highly Cited Researchers 2023 list from Clarivate. The annual list features the researchers in the top 1% of the Web of Science citation index and recognises pioneers in their field whose citation records position them in the very highest strata of research influence and impact.

238 researchers globally have been named in two fields, including UCC's Professor Paul Ross, Professor John Crvan and Professor Timothy Dinan from APC Microbiome Ireland, a Science Foundation Ireland (SFI) Research Centre based here in UCC.

The global list features 7.125 researchers from 67 countries and regions this year - 3.793 in specific fields and 3.332 for cross-field impact. UCC researchers were recognised as global leaders in fields such as food, health, medicine, neonatology. neuroscience, psychiatry and psychology.

The research was led by Professor Yvonne Nolan, APC Microbiome Ireland, a world leading SFI funded research centre based at University College Cork (UCC), and the **Department of Anatomy and** Neuroscience, UCC, with Professor Sandrine Thuret at King's College London and Dr Annamaria Cattaneo IRCCS Fatebenefratelli, Italy. The study supports the emergence of the gut microbiome as a key target for investigation in Alzheimer's disease due to its particular susceptibility to lifestyle and environmental influences.

Published in Brain, the study shows that that the memory impairments in people with Alzheimer's could be transferred to young animals through transplant of gut microbiota. Alzheimer's patients had a higher abundance of inflammationpromoting bacteria in faecal samples, and these changes were directly associated with their cognitive status.

Congratulations to INFANT researchers who are part of an international collaboration highlighting the benefits of deferred cord clamping in preterm infants. Waiting for two minutes to clamp the umbilical cord of a premature baby soon after birth could significantly reduce the risk of death relative to immediate clamping.

Researchers at the Irish Centre for Maternal and Child Health Research (INFANT) at University College Cork were part of the major international iCOMP collaboration which examined clinical trial data and outcomes of thousands of premature babies across the world.

Two trials conducted at Cork University Maternity Hospital contributed to this database, one of the world's largest databases in this research field, with over 60 studies and including more than 9,000 babies.

Their findings are published in **The Lancet**.





Professor Eugene Dempsey, Horgan Chair in Neonatology, INFANT Centre UCC, who led the Irish trials said: "Until recently, the standard practice was to clamp the umbilical cord immediately after birth for premature babies. The findings from these reviews highlight the significant benefits of deferred cord clamping for preterm delivery. and it is clear now that except in rare circumstances, immediate clamping should be avoided."



Professor Geraldine Boylan, Director of INFANT Centre, commented on the findings: "The high-impact findings published in The Lancet emphasise the importance of global collaborative research and clearly demonstrates the impact of clinical trials on neonatal care and outcomes for premature babies."
