



NATIONAL PRACTICE TEACHING IN SOCIAL WORK INITIATIVE

Mark Doel

Professor Doel, PhD, is a registered social worker and Professor Emeritus at Sheffield Hallam University, UK. He has twenty years' community-based social work practice, specialising in groupwork and task-centred practice. He has experience as a social work teacher and trainer, practice educator, head of school of social work, a

researcher, project director, PhD supervisor, and external examiner. He leads workshops in practice education, groupwork and dilemmas In social work practice. Mark has published many scholarly articles and chapters as well as 23 books, most recently a second edition of Social Work: The Basics (Routledge). He recently published a novel, *In Soviet Times People Knew Where To Cross The Road.*

Mark has many connections with Ireland, including External Examinerships past and present at UCC, Trinity College, NUI Galway, Maynooth and with the Practice Teaching Programme in Northern Ireland.

He is researching the use of objects in direct practice, in collaboration with Coram/BAAF. Mark has lived and worked in the US, has extensive experience in eastern Europe, including both Russia and Ukraine, and works alongside community activists in Kolkata, India. He is Honorary Professor at Tbilisi State University, Georgia, Visiting Scholar at Pretoria University, South Africa, and at Universidad de los Lagos, Chile. He is a former Vice-President of the International Association for Social Work with Groups.

Mark helps plan the annual Nether Edge Festival, a community celebration in a neighbourhood of Sheffield.

As an independent her work is varied but includes training, devising practice learning resources and consultancy work. Siobhan still very much enjoys working as a practice

educator and currently works with a few students a year in an off site capacity.

In 2004 Siobhan was appointed to the position of Secretary of the International Federation of Social Workers, holding this position for eight years. She still maintains close international links and enjoys working to support practice educators in countries where social work education is in the early stages of development. She recently Co-Directed an IFSW project on 'new social workers' which explored the experiences of those in the final year of study and through the first five years in practice.

Siobhan has written widely, mostly around social work theory and critical reflection. She is committed to making the knowledge base accessible to busy practitioners and set up Kirwin Maclean Associates as an independent publishing organisation based on the values and ethics of social work.

Siobhan recently moved to Northern Ireland where she has enjoyed taking on the practice teacher role. Moving contexts and getting used to a different set of standards and paperwork has reminded Siobhan just what it feels like to be new to the practice teaching role! Siobhan is a Visiting Professor at the University of Chester. She is also an Editorial Board member of the Journal of Practice Teaching and Learning.

Marguerita McGovern has many years experience as a Practice Learning Co- ordinator and

quest lecturer on the Masters in Social Work programme at University of Galway, Ireland. In addition she has designed and worked on the Postgraduate Diploma in Practice Teaching, Supervision and Management available at the University of Galway. Her professional social work practice has covered areas within the Northern Ireland health services and as a Psychiatric Social Worker in University College Hospital, Galway.

Marguerita has presented at numerous conferences in the U.S. and Ireland. To date she has made a series of seven eBooks to support and 'wrap around' the placement experience. These include topics such as; language, beginnings and expectations, failing forward, reflective practice, urban and rural home visiting, endings and group work. Marguerita's latest published research is focused on examples of Irish students failing placement.

Erna is a CORU registered social worker. Prior to joining the university, she worked as a social worker in drug treatment and HIV services and a social work team leader in hospital-based social work. Her PhD dissertation was based on a practitioner research study on relationship-based social work in response to trauma.

Erna's teaching and research interests include trauma, bereavement, relationshipbased practice, reflective practice and practice teaching and learning. She has published on many aspects of social work practice education including relational practice in social work placements, experiences of failing students and social work placements in the context of Covid.

Erna is a board member of The Global Partnership for Transformative Social Work and a member of the National Practice Teaching in Social Work Initiative team.



Prof. Audrey Roulston

Professor of Social Work in Palliative Care at the School of Social Sciences. Education and Social Work in Queen's University, Belfast.

Dr Helen Cleak

Dr Helen Cleak PhD.is an Adjunct Associate Professor at La Trobe University Victoria, and the University of Southern Queensland, Australia. She has been a Director of Field Education for over two decades and her co-authored book, 'Making the Most of Field Placement' (5th edition) has been adopted as the

major fieldwork text in most Australian social work programs. She has developed strong research collaboration with academics from Trinity College, Republic of Ireland and Queens College, Northern Ireland and the group have published in the areas of student satisfaction with their practice learning, the learning activities that promote students confidence and sense of professional identity and issues relating to students who fail placement. She is on the Editorial Board of Australian Social Work and is a program accreditor for the Australian Association of Social Workers.

Elaine Wilson

Elaine Wilson is the Associate Dean, Graduate Social Sciences, UCD and is an academic in the School of Social Policy, Social Work and Social Policy. She graduated from University College Dublin with a Master Social Science (Social Work) and worked as a Senior Medical Social Worker and Acting Head of Department in

St. Vincent's University Hospital, Dublin. Having worked as an oncology social worker for a number of years, she took up a Research Fellowship position with The Cancer Clinical Research Trust. This position involved health economics research as well as doctoral research into the psychosocial effects of early stage breast cancer on young women. She has two primary areas of research interest. 1 - Social work education, with a particular focus on practice learning, practice teaching and adult learning. 2 - The psycho-social needs of people with cancer, the needs of people as they make the transition from treatment to survivorship, and the social construction of illness.



Dr Niamh Flanagan

Dr Niamh Flanagan is an Assistant Professor and Director of Social Policy Programmes in the Department of Applied Social Studies Maynooth University, Ireland, where she teaches child and family policy, policy for practice and policy research and analysis. She has lectured in research methods and social policy in several third level institutions and has specialised in teaching research for practice to social workers, youth workers and community workers. Niamh plays an active role in the promotion and development of research among social work practitioners at institutional and national levels. This dual interest in research and social work was the driving force behind her doctoral research on the information behaviour of social workers which was funded by the Irish Minister for Children and Youth Affairs and prompted the development of a Mentor Strategy in the Irish Child & Family Agency, Tusla. Niamh's work as an independent research and policy consultant, partnering with a broad range of organisations from academia, local community groups to government departments, has inspired a keen interest in creative research methodologies which respond to the unique characteristics of research participants. Her research interests include child and family studies, domestic violence, information behaviour, and learning on professional placement.

PRACTICE CORNER: Advice To Practice Teachers And Students

Emer Coyne, Senior Medical Social Work Practitioner and Practice teacher discusses the benefit of being a practice teacher and offers valuable advice.

"Being a Practice Teacher in Social Work always brings me back to my time as a student. I was so lucky to have been given the opportunity to learn skills from excellent social workers in differing fields of work. It is important for me professionally to be able to repay that to the next generation of Social Workers. Being part of their education is a privilege.

In my experience of practice teaching, students bring a wonderful 'freshness' both to the team and to me as a practitioner. Practice Teaching is always a very rewarding process and fulfilling to see a student's confidence and skills develop as the placement progresses. My advice to any social worker considering practice teaching is to not hesitate and make the commitment. I have facilitated students through the uncertainty of the covid pandemic in 2020 and the health service cyber-attack in 2021, along with other bumps in the road along the way. Following these challenges, I feel that when a practice teacher and student demonstrate a commitment to the placement, it will be a positive experience for both sides and an important professional relationship that continues for years.

Practical tip: An organised placement works well as the student knows what is expected of them and the practice teacher knows what learning experiences to offer. Plan week-by-week aims and objectives in supervision!".



Jennifer Conroy: Graduate from BSW in UCC reflects on her placements and offers advice to students going on placement.

"I had the advantage of observing both sides of the Covid-19 pandemic through my work placements as a BSW graduate of 2021. Both were outstanding, and it was great to experience social work practice before COVID-19 and during the pandemic. Throughout my placements, I was able to gain a great understanding of the profession's versatility as well as a perspective on the extent to which the pandemic affected patients, service users, and the profession itself.

On reflection of my experiences, I think it is important to be flexible and make the most of your time. Whatever field of social work you are placed in, learning from experiences and personal growth are what will shape you into the best social worker you can be, so embrace the challenge, give it your all and ask lots of questions. I had an incredible tutor and practice teachers who respectfully guided me as I navigated through both placements. They supported and challenged me throughout which really enhanced my professional development. Through critical reflection and excellent supervision, I had the opportunity to recognise what my own unique skillset can bring to my practice which enriched the development of my social work skills, values and competencies.

I am currently working as a Medical Social Worker and Advocacy manager with Silverstream Healthcare. I am based in Riverstick Care Centre which, in partnership with SSWHG, has a transitional care unit for acute patients (currently from CUH) and a long-term care facility".
