The World Health Organisation designated 2020 as the "International Year of the Nurse and Midwife". Nurses are the frontline and backbone of health care delivery comprising over 50% of the global healthcare workforce. The WHO notes that there is a global shortage of nurses estimated to be in the region of 5.9 million. Today's nurses care for patients across the lifespan; run their own clinics, diagnose patients, prescribe X-Rays and medications, lead complete episodes of care; work in partnership with patients and their families across teams and services; and can also be found leading cutting-edge research programmes. In developing countries and geographically remote areas, they are often, the first and only point of care in their communities.

Over 5,500 nurses and midwives have qualified from the School of Nursing and Midwifery, University College Cork over its 27 years history. The School has grown from a class of 36 public health nursing students in 1994 to over 1300 undergraduate and postgraduate students today studying across programmes, designed to meet the evolving health care needs of the population and span areas such as intellectual disability, mental health, public health, children's, general nursing and midwifery. Many nurses and midwives choose programmes, which provide them with specialist and advanced knowledge and skills, some work as advanced nurse/midwife practitioners.

Because the arts and humanities address the responses of human beings to a variety of experiences, they offer nurses, midwives (and nurse educators) a unique strategy to facilitate the integration of the science of nursing with the art of nursing. Thus, the linkage of UCC's School of Nursing and Midwifery with the Radical Humanities Laboratory is an exciting next chapter in the ongoing development of the School. The Radical Humanities Laboratory for us in the School of Nursing and Midwifery- mean that educators, researchers, students can learn, research and will work across disciplinary boundaries. When we bring together different disciplines for example the humanities, social science, health and the arts, such trans -boundary collaboration provides insight into the human condition, illness and suffering, perception of oneself, the disciplines and professions of nursing and midwifery and healthcare.

Such trans -boundary collaboration provides a new lens through which we can collectively explore Wicked problems for example- persistent poverty, the advancing obesity epidemic, inequalities, increasing number of people with mental health issues. This new lens for example can be creativity, artistic and design thinking applied to a problem, music as an intervention in healthcare- or a focus on new models-- empowerment- - working with children, families and communities whilst cocreating- sustainable, locally informed and realistic approaches to addressing some of the Wicked healthcare and societal problems of our time. Why humanities in UCC and the School of Nursing and Midwifery? Currently many of our researchers and lecturers are engaged in teaching and learning across the University and in research and outreach activities which have a clear link to the humanities some examples include Dr Johnny Goodwin and his work with Intinn- a film based mental health and wellbeing workshop aimed at young people and Dr Anne Marie Martin's work around promoting social inclusion for individuals with severe and profound intellectual disability and Dr Aine O'Donovan's research in empowering children, families and communities to develop positive mental health in times of rapid change.

Overall UCC's School of Nursing and Midwifery attributes its top 50 place in the QS rankings to the effectiveness of transboundary working and collaborations which help to creates a disruptive thinking paradigm which helps to advance our thinking and collective response to societal challenges.
