DEVELOPMENTS IN PRACTICE

In 2014 the two week 'Big Picture' practice, which was typically undertaken at the start of Year 2, was removed from the practice curriculum and replaced by a two week practice in Year 1. The Year 1 practice is primarily an observation based experience focusing on an introduction to the role of the Occupational Therapist and to develop professional and communication skills.

Year 2 students continue to undertake an eight week practice.

Prior to going on practice Year 1 students prepare by undertaking these elements: First Aid – 2 days

Moving & Handling – 1 day

Hand Hygiene – HSELand online certificate and a practical session

LIBRARY ACCESS

Who is this for?

Practice educators - those facilitating students on practice

What is involved?

Educators wishing to use the UCC Library facilities may apply through the department on a 'visitor basis'. A library account will be created and an access card will be issued to the educator directly.



PRACTICE EDUCATOR WORKSHOP KILKENNY

After the very successful Practice Education Workshop in September 2015; we are happy to announce the continuation of these workshops. The forthcoming workshop will be

held in Lacken, Kilkenny. This continues as a two day Practice Educator workshop on the 18th & 19th of May. 14 people have registered to attend. This is the level 1 Practice Education Workshop covering introduction to the Practice Education module within UCC Undergraduate programme. The workshop addresses topics such as tasks required on practice, supervision styles, how to give effective feedback to students and managing challenging situations. A question and answer forum will allow participants to discuss their views and opinions. Please keep an eye out for future workshop dates. These will be condensed to half day workshops covering aspects such as supporting the struggling student, the 2:1 teaching model and giving supervision.

BEING AN EDUCATOR

I can remember clearly my very first placement as an OT student, the nerves, the excitement, the fear of the unknown. I think my first time as a Practice Educator wasn't too far off the same experience. I am now working as a qualified occupational therapist in Disability Support Services in UCC, a position that stemmed from a 'role emerging' placement I had there as a student in 2013.

I took my first students in Sept 2015 (two students together). I had decided on using the 2:1 model of placement as this site is quite unstructured and it was felt that the two students would be a valuable support to each other. Little did I know that they would be a most valuable support to me as well. As the sole OT in this service it can be difficult to trial new ideas, keep up to date on the latest research or simply spread the message of OT. I found that having students is a great opportunity to do those creative projects that you have been longing to do or to move outside the constraints of the day to day running of a service.

Since then I have had other students on site whilst continuing to use the 2:1 model and have been able to start a journal club, create and design new resources for service users, run mental health events, increase promotion of the service and provide a variety of groups and workshops. I would strongly encourage anyone to experiment with the 2:1 model of placement if you wish to add depth and new learning to your service.

SHARE WHAT IS HAPPENING IN YOUR AREA

Over the past 18 months Occupational Therapy has been involved with two new initiatives in the North Cork Adult Mental Health Service Fermoy area. An OT colleague (Pauline Keohane) and I, established a gardening group last summer in conjunction with a local FETAC horticultural course. Engagement with the project by service users has been strong, with some of the members bringing in their own tools and actively researching what to grow. Members have been pleased and proud taking home the produce. "I could just go down to Lidl and buy vegetables but it's not about that.... it's about the doing, the whole thing, growing them ourselves..." (Gardening Group member). A new Health & Wellbeing group for clients of the Rehab service has seen a very positive uptake. This is a 3 month pilot project with a MDT approach. It is facilitated weekly and typically occupies a whole morning and lunchtime. There are three key components to the structure of the group beginning with a Self Awareness/Psychoeducation session, then a walk, followed by preparing & eating a healthy meal together – the menu has been decided the week before by everyone and shopping is done in the morning by members before the start. The walks have included Kilworth Woods and 'The Towers', Lismore. The group has been very popular with more wanting to join.
