DEVELOPMENTS IN PRACTICE EDUCATION

Year 1 Preparation for Practice has been changed to include 6x 2hr sessions over the course of the term in addition to one full day prior to practice placement. The reason for this is to integrate practice across the semester allowing students to make links between academic teaching and clinical placement and prevent information saturation immediately prior to practice. Furthermore, the CBFE assessment form for the Year 1 practice has been modified to make it more compatible to the shorter two-week practice making it less time consuming to complete.

OTPEN/PECNet: The national Occupational Therapy Practice Education Network (OTPEN) have been meeting regularly over the past two years to share ideas and look at possible joint research options. The Office of Health and Social Care have approved funding for the following two projects:

- A. To recommend a national framework for incentivising and credentialing health and social care professional managers, practice tutors, regional placement facilitators and practice educators.
- managers, practice tutors, regional placement facilitators and practice educators.
- B. To develop a national quality framework for practice education systems for health and social care professionals.

Other News: Award for Occupational Therapist:

In December 2017 Occupational Therapist, Leona Moynihan & Social Worker, Conor Crowley from South Lee Mental Health Services, along with the Blackrock Hall Men's group, were the joint winners of the 2017 Health Management Institute Leaders Award A short, two-part film project, "*Personal Journeys of Stigma and Recovery*" was written and produced by the men's social group within the Blackrock/Mahon adult mental health services. Over the course of 2016/2017 men's stories from personal experiences of stigma, to the resilience and strength gained through the recovery process were documented. The films provide an excellent insight into how the individual copes with his everyday mental health struggles. Since its inception, the film project has been very warmly received by a number of forums such as local carer's support groups, Hearing Voices groups and the UCC Critical Voices conference. The project has also been highly commended by the 2017 HSE Excellence Awards panel.

I work in the Occupational Therapy department in North Cork Mental Health Services based in St Stephens Hospital, Sarsfield Court, Glanmire. For me being a Practice Educator means teaching skills in the profession I enjoy working in. I love to share my own knowledge but also equally love it when I get students who are full of ideas, creativity and desire to learn.

I find many students have hidden talents and are shy to share them. When on placement in mental health they are encouraged to bring these talents to the fore in a meaningful and purposeful way; to use them as part of therapeutic interventions with clients. By sharing their musical, sporting or artistic talents, they can promote wellness with more ease for those they work with. It can assist to give students confidence if using familiar hobbies as skills to aid clients in their therapeutic pathway.

I feel very privileged to be an educator to be able to provide a resource for our OT's of the future. For me I would never have become an educator a number of years ago only for the encouragement and support of my previous OT manager and the Practice Tutor Shelley Mack. SHARE WHAT IS HAPPENING IN YOUR AREA

EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT

Since January 2017, there has been a full time OT and Physio service to the Emergency Department in University Hospital Waterford on a pilot basis, funded by winter initiative money. Since mid-2017 there has also been a Social Worker in post. The main aim of the OT service is the following: to assess a patient's functional and cognitive capacity, their ability to carry out their ADLs, assessment of home environment and need for aids/adaptive equipment and supports, provide education to patient and families, refer to appropriate services and D/C planning. Our main aim is for people to be discharged directly home and if this is not possible early referral to the ward is key. This pilot programme has proven very successful with the approval of a fulltime senior post being granted recently. Understandably the nursing staff and medical team were initially unsure as to our role but with time they have come to understand and greatly appreciate the service. I personally feel very fortunate for the opportunity to work in such an upcoming area which is fast- paced, dynamic and rewarding, with every day offering something (or someone!) new and challenging. I am currently facilitating a third year UCC student, who is thoroughly enjoying the area and learning a lot. As a member of the Dementia Special Interest Group my current endeavour is to increase awareness and use of the, 'This is Me' tool in the department to gain information on what a person with dementia likes & dislikes so we can better understand and care for them. This initiative is developing successfully with many more exciting changes to come including further liaison with WICOP (Waterford Integrated Care for Older People) and an ANP (Advanced Nurse Practitioner) for frailty. *Eimear Kealey, Basic Grade Occupational Therapist, University Hospital Waterford*.
