WHAT CAN ENGLISH GRADUATES OFFER EMPLOYERS?


Graduates in English have a range of transferable skills, including the ability to:






Gain practical experience through summer or part-time employment in relevant organisations.



Gain relevant skills and experience through participating in the 'UCC Works' Award programme.




Gain relevant skills and experience by taking an active role in a club/ society that interests you, or the Students' Union.



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


