Google Books

If you type the topic of your research into the Google search bar, and you will find a list of books associated with that topic. Click on 'search tools' and then 'any books' and select 'preview available'. The list of books will change to feature only those, which you may partially read. Even though access to the entire book is restricted, Google Books is a valuable research tool.

This project is the product of a partnership between RTÉ History, UCC and the Department of Culture, Heritage and the Gaeltacht.

Launched in May 2018, the Great Irish Famine Online is a major collaboration between the Geography Department in UCC and the Department of Culture, Heritage and the Gaeltacht. The valuable online resource provides detailed information about the social, political and economic landscape of pre and post-Famine Ireland. Maps at Civil Parish level, visually depict changes in population; variations in levels of education; distribution of first, second, third and fourth class housing and types of occupation which prevailed in different localities. The scope of the project encompasses more than three thousand Civil Parishes in Ireland and is available through an App or online.

The Digital Irish Famine Archive makes accessible eyewitness accounts of the Irish famine migration to Canada in 1847-1848. The archive contains the annals of the Grey Nuns of Montreal, or Sisters of Charity, who first tended to Irish famine emigrants, especially widows and orphans, in the city's fever sheds in 1847 and 1848. It also includes testimonies from Irish famine orphans.
