PhD Scholarship Opportunity - Doctoral Researcher in Dept Sociology & Criminology affiliated to ISS21 and UCC Futures: Collective Social Futures.

Applications are invited for a PhD scholarship to participate in the project EUROBORDERWALKS. This ground-breaking Irish Research Council Advanced Laureate funded project seeks to address a 'grand challenge' that exists in the sociological literature across critical border studies and the mobilities field, which is the dearth of ethnographic, biographical and visual, relational research on borders and 'borderities' at the edges of the European Union and the very meaning, experience and practice of borders, especially in contributing to European policy and education.

The successful applicant will make a key contribution to ethno-mimetic research in relation to ethnographic, biographical and arts based research on borders and 'borderities' with a specific focus on conducting a deep biographical mapping of the Irish Border using the walking interview as biographical method.

Background

EUROBORDERWALKS is an inter disciplinary, inter institutional and European research project anchored in biographical and mobile methodologies, the leadership and long history of the PI in this area together with the expertise by the collaborating partners in the University of Lodz and the University of Zagreb.

Many of the associated challenges with Europe's borders, in critical border studies, relate to border security concerns, especially in relation to unregulated migration, increasing nationalism, the risks of soft or porous borders, geopolitical shifts, as well as the impact of the UK exit from the European Union, and war. An important contribution of this research is to open up horizons for research, knowledge, understanding *and* teaching and learning, from an 'ethno-mimetic' approach that involves documenting and writing the biography of three borders from 'below' as well as to impact upon policy, through a policy report, policy briefing, exhibition and a curriculum contribution to second level sociology education.

The research brings together sociological researchers with artists to critically analyse and understand the shifting and im/mobile borders, the securitisation and policing of borders, and contribute to critical border studies, mobilities and 'mobility justice' for our collective social futures.

The PhD researcher will work with the Principle Investigator, Professor Maggie O'Neill with a focus on the Irish border, and be supported by collaborating academics across the research team. This team will work as part of a wider network of sociological and inter disciplinary researchers engaged in the wider EUROBORDERWALKS project based at UCC and in the Department of Sociology, University of Zagreb and the Institute of Sociology, University of Lodz. Dr Michael Mcloughlin, the artist working with the team on the Irish border will be an advisor on the PhD team.

The duration of the PhD will be three years, and will formally start in Work Package One on 1st April 2024.

The successful candidate will be required to attend UCC in person.

The successful candidate will become an affiliated member of the Institute for Social Science in the 21st Century (ISS21) and UCC Futures: Collective Social Futures and be based in the Department of Sociology & Criminology.

Interviews are expected to take place at the end of March 2024

Essential criteria:

- Honours Degree and a Masters Degree in a discipline of relevance to EUROBORDERWALKS (Sociology, Anthropology, Social Science). (MA degree must be awarded).
- Qualitative research skills including skills in data collection
- Excellent communication skills in both written and oral format
- Ability to work independently and take own initiative
- Ability to work in an inter disciplinary team
- Ability to participate fully in the operational aspects of the project. This will include stakeholder engagement, event organisation, public communication, and dissemination of the project's goals and findings to academic, policy, and wider stakeholders
- Previous experience with stakeholder engagement, particularly with community based organisations.
- Strong motivation to undertake a PhD, and in particular a passion to undertake biographical research at the Irish border using the walking interview as biographical research method.
- Strong motivation to publish in academic journals

Desirable criteria:

- Experience in interdisciplinary research with the ability to engage across diverse disciplines and practices
- Experience in conducting qualitative and quantitative data analysis
- Completed courses in research integrity, research ethics and data protection
- Experience in writing in scientific publications
