Welcome to the first issue of the ISS21 newsletter, where we will be showcasing ISS21 research and keeping you up to date with Institute news and events.

This is an exciting time for ISS21. In the summer, we moved into our dedicated office space in Carrigbawn/Safari, while in October, Dr. Margaret Scanlon joined the ISS21 team as part-time Research Coordinator. The launch of the UCC Strategic Plan 2017-2022 and Strategic Plan for Research and Innovation 2017-22 has invigorated discussion about the future direction of the Institute, and we are delighted to see the continued emphasis on fostering interdisciplinarity in these documents, which is at the core of ISS21's vision. The Institute has over 100 members from across the colleges of Arts, Celtic Studies, and Social Sciences (CACSSS), Business and Law, and Medicine and Health, many of whom are active members of ISS21's research clusters. In the last couple of months, ISS21 research clusters have been planning their activities for 2018, with some new working groups and clusters emerging. We are delighted to see the

emergence of a new research working group, led by Dr. Carol Kelleher (Management and Marketing) and Dr. Jacqui O'Riordan (Applied Social Studies) around the theme of Caring, and the reinvigoration of an interdisciplinary health research cluster.

ISS21 members continue to be successful in receiving funding awards from a variety of sources, and have been recognised for their research excellence, with the GENOVATE project team winning UCC's Research Team of the Year award 2017. ISS21 has also been casting its eye to impact, and how we can best demonstrate the way in which ISS21 research and activities contribute societal value. Over the summer, we participated in a pilot project facilitated by CACSSS, to develop an impact case study template. This has been both an excellent opportunity to demonstrate the considerable outputs and impacts of the Institute, and to contribute to broader debates about how we understand and think about impact in the University. We look forward to continuing this important work in 2018.

### LICENSEES IN THE PRIVATE RENTED SECTOR: A FORGOTTEN SUB SECTOR?

The seminar "Licensees in the Private Rented Sector: A Forgotten Sub sector?" was hosted by the School of Applied Social Studies, Threshold and ISS21 on 26th October 2017. The seminar was attended by representatives from a range of housing and social service and advocacy organisations. Speakers included: Dr.Cathal O'Connell (UCC), Ms Sheehy-Skeffington (barrister), Mr Kevin Nam and Mr Young Suk of the Korean Society of Ireland and Mr David Jones of Threshold, the national housing advice agency. Dr Mark Cullinane presented the findings of the Licensees in the Private Rented Sector (LIPRES) Project, which

#### **POST-CAREGIVING SEMINAR**

On 6 November 2017 the ISS21 Caring Research Working Group hosted a seminar on family caring in Ireland, with a particular focus on the experience of carers after their care-giving role had ceased. Reports from two IRC New Foundations research projects were officially launched at the event.

## Selected events hosted by ISS21 in 2017

ISS21 Children and Young People Cluster, with Mental Health and Disability Cluster *Interdisciplinary Encounters: Neuroscience, Social Science and the Politics of Research,* **5 May 2017.** A half day seminar with international speakers exploring the relationship between neuroscientific and social scientific knowledges in the context of early intervention with children, and autism.

#### ISS21 Civil Society Cluster *The New Faces of Community, Voluntary and Cooperative Organisations,* 20 March, 2017.

A seminar exploring the changing character of Voluntary and Community Sector (VCS) and community cooperatives in England, and what can be learnt in Ireland.

ISS21 Migration and Integration Cluster and Y-MOBILITY Project *Looking Ahead: Brexit, Borders and Belongings,* **10 March 2017.** An international half-day event which explored key questions raised by the prospect of Brexit in relation to international borders, migrations, im/mobilities and belongings.

## ISS21 Research Projects

The Institute is hosting a number of different research projects of varying scale and size, addressing issues of key societal significance including energy, citizenship and sustainability (ENTRUST), youth migration (Y-MOBILITY), community development and participation, disabled people's geographies of (un)safety in the context of hostility and fear of crime (SAFE(R)SPACE), caring for family members with dementia, and experiences of urban regeneration. Project funders include Horizon 2020 (ENTRUST, Y-MOBILITY), the Irish Research Council, Cork City Council, and the National Disability Authority.



Youth mobility Maximising opportunities for individuals, labour markets and regions in Europe

Funded by Horizon 2020, YMOBILITY is developing an enhanced understanding of youth mobility and migration in Europe.

2017 also saw the completion of a number of projects, including two IRC New Foundation research projects (one on housing precarity, and the other on postcaregiving experiences), and the conclusion of the large-scale, multi-partner EU 7th Framework GENOVATE project.

## New project on Universal Design in outdoor playspaces

Congratulations to Dr. Helen Lynch who received funding in September 2017 for a joint Department of Occupational Science and Occupational Therapy/ISS21 project entitled *Community parks and playgrounds: intergenerational participation through Universal Design*. Universal Design (UD) seeks to promote the design of environments that are usable, inclusive and accessible for as many people as possible, including people with disabilities, those who may use physical or mobility supports, and those of different ages. However, while UD principles have been explored in the design of the built environment, there has been little application to spaces where children live their lives, including outdoor playspaces. Working with Cork City Council, the project will involve (i) conducting audits of 5 playgrounds in the city to explore how far they meet Universal Design principles, and (ii) working with children and their families using a variety of methods to capture their experiences of these playspaces. It is hoped that this work will contribute to both theoretical and practical debates about the potential of UD to contribute to more inclusive playspaces for children and their families.

# Research outputs and impact

ISS21 researchers continue to make an impact by producing new knowledge through international academic publications, research reports, conferences and other forms of print and broadcast media, with their research contributing to academic as well as broader public and policy debate about key social issues in Irish society, including caring, young people's lives, and the consequences of Brexit.

### Developing an impact case study

During summer 2017, ISS21 worked with CACSSS and Sarah Bowman from Trinity College Dublin on a pilot project to develop an impact case study for the Institute, with a view to developing a template for other research projects and centres. This process involved identifying and articulating the outcomes and impacts of the Institute's work across a range of impact categories, including social, cultural and economic criteria, and beginning to chart impact 'pathways' or 'journeys'.

Impact itself is contested terrain, and in the coming year, ISS21 will be reflecting in more depth on what impact means in the context of social science, and in terms of the work that we do. The case study has however powerfully kick-started this process, and draws attention to extent of new knowledge produced and exchanged by the Institute, the contribution ISS21 has made to the development of specific policies and policy debates, and the development of national and international collaborations which have fostered engaged research with a range of organisations and groups.

GENOVATE was awarded the UCC Research Team of the Year Award 2017. Funded under the European Union's 7th Framework Programme, the <u>GENOVATE</u> project at UCC was part of the <u>cross-European</u> <u>GENOVATE Consortium</u> project that ran from 2013 to 2017.
