Ageing, global inequalities, loss of social trust, social conflict, war, migration, populist authoritarianism, increases in racism and incivilities, particularly in relation to new arrival communities, are some of the issues our affiliated researchers and civil society partners are grappling with. Developing our local and international collaborations and networks, supporting and building the capacity of doctoral students and early career researchers and working in partnership with community and academic partners is central to the mission of ISS21 both now and into the future.

We have a number of visiting academics joining us in 2024 and look

ISS21 is also the lead partner in an exciting 'Futures' focused research development at UCC - Collective Social Futures (CSF). CSF is a cross university research platform that developed in response to a call to identify areas of strategic importance to UCC Futures. CSF hosted a Festival of Social Science over two days, which was a wonderful celebration of social science research and community engagement (see page 6). What is clear to all in ISS21 is that the key global challenges and how we might understand, envision and enact our collective social futures, need to be understood and addressed from sociological and inter-disciplinary social science perspectives, because they are deeply social issues. I look forward to working with everyone in ISS21 and encourage new membership and research clusters!

Selected Events 2023

'At your Age?!' Ethnodrama, 26 January

A performance of 'At your Age?!' was staged at the Granary Theatre, Cork on the 26 January. Produced as part of the innovative AgeActed project, the play explored the themes of ageing and ageism, and was performed by the research participants.

Border Securitisation and the Criminalization of Migration, 24 February

As part of Refugee Week 2023, the ISS21 Migration and Integration Research Cluster and UNIC hosted a seminar with Dr. Gustavo de la Orden Bosch (University of Deusto). While discussions on EU border management usually focus on external borders, this seminar highlighted developments in border restrictions at the Franco-Spanish border in the Basque Country.

Qualitative Research in Crosscultural and Non-Western Settings, 22 March

The ISS21 REACT Cluster, with colleagues in Applied Social Studies and the UCC Ethics Committee, hosted a seminar in which Prof. Divya Sharma (Western Connecticut State University) discussed ethical and methodological approaches and challenges in conducting qualitative research in crosscultural and non-Western settings.

Unleashing the voice within: **Challenging Current Responses** of Mental Health Systems to Young People in Distress, 3 April

This timely event explored different ways of supporting young people experiencing distress, beyond the current services available, with contributions from mental health campaigners, youth work organisations, and student representatives. Co-hosted by the ISS21 Disability and Mental Health Cluster, CVNI and Mad in Ireland.

Canadian & Irish Research and Practice in Housing First & Rapid Rehousing, 20th April

In this half-day event, visiting speakers Prof. Stephen Gaetz (York University, Toronto) and Dr Melanie Redman (President of A Way Home Canada), along with researchers from UCC, shared their research on homelessness and on initiatives to tackle homelessness in Canada and Ireland.

Duty to Care and Solidarity: Counter-hegemonic Civic Acts in **Authoritarian Contexts** 21 April

Visiting speaker Dr. Violetta Zentai (Central European University) explored the cumulative experiences and consequences of conducting civic solidarity acts during the Covid-19 pandemic and in the current war-related displacement of Ukrainians in Europe. The seminar was jointly hosted by ISS21, PRECNIGHTS and the Doctor of Social Science Programme.

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Leaving No One Behind: Health Inequalities on the Island of Ireland, 27 April

Co-hosted by the ISS21 SHAPE and REACT research clusters, this one-day symposium brought together academics, policy makers and practitioners to discuss health inequalities on the island of Ireland. A number of themes were explored through panel discussions, including health economics, mental health provision, and health in the community.

Competing Requirements in Hungarian Higher Education, 31 August

Visiting academic Prof. Ágnes Kövér-Van Til (Eötvös Loránd University, Budapest) discussed Hungarian gender policy, and the contradictions with the EU's gender mainstreaming expectations.

IMMERSE Conference, 15 September

This conference presented the findings from the Horizon 2020 IMMERSE project on the integration of migrant children in schools, along with contributions from policy makers, key stakeholders and young migrant activists. Highlights of the day included the IMMERSE children's art and poetry exhibition.

Belonging and Narrative, 20th September

Hosted by the Dept. of Sociology and Criminology and ISS21, this half-day symposium included keynote presentations from Prof. Nira Yuval-Davis (University of East London) and Prof. Molly Andrews (UCL).

Every Moment Counts: Promoting Mental Wellbeing and Inclusion in Schools, 13 Nov.

Fulbright Scholar Dr Susan Bazyk presented a seminar on her innovative work in school inclusion, focusing on the Every Moment Counts programme. Hosted by the ISS21 Children and Young People Research Cluster.

Navigating the Hostile **Environment - Afghan Evacuees** in London, 14 November

Drawing on qualitative research, Professor Louise Ryan (London Metropolitan University) explored the experiences of Afghan evacuees during their first year in London. Seminar cohosted by the Department of Sociology & Criminology and the ISS21 Migration and Integration Research Cluster.

Other ISS21 Events

During 2023, ISS21's CareVisions project hosted several events on different aspects of care including 'Valuing Care in Feminist and Disability Politics' 24 April (with Prof. Janice McLaughlin), 'Informal Care and the Precariousness of Migration Experience' 13 Nov. (with Prof. Herz; Frida Andréasson and Prof Jesper Andreasson), and the launch of the CareVisions report, 12 December (with keynote from Prof. Joan Tronto).







ISS21 Projects

There are currently 18 ISS21-affiliated projects, most of which are co-hosted with schools and departments across the university (see opposite). Projects are linked to the themes of the ISS21 research clusters and address significant intersectional social issues in the fields of Deaf Studies, migration, health and well-being, ageing, civic engagement, and equality and social justice.

Several major new projects got underway during 2023 funded through the SFI-IRC Pathway Programme, the IRC Advanced Laureate Awards, and the HRB's Emerging Investigator for Health Awards. We are also delighted to be cohosting two of the recently announced IRC New Foundations awards. 2023 also saw the completion of several ISS21-affiliated projects, including two longrunning Horizon 2020 projects – PositivMasc and IMMERSE.

ISS21 Welcomes Research Fellow & **New Staff Members**

During 2023 we were delighted to welcome Dr Noel O'Connell, who joins ISS21 as a Research Fellow under the SFI-IRC Pathway Programme. Dr O'Connell's research project, CODA: A Hidden Minority Amongst the Majority (2023-2028) will explore how hearing children of deaf adults (CODAs) experience the courtesy stigma (or stigma-by-association) of their parents and the cultural resources they use to become agents of their own empowerment.

CODA adopts novel cross-disciplinary research approaches by combining theory from Sociology with insights from Deaf Studies and Childhood Studies in order to explore two fundamental social concerns: (1) the problem of courtesy stigma affecting children and families; (2) and the complex nature of identity in an ableist society. The CODA project is co-hosted with the School of Applied Social Studies.

We were also delighted to welcome several new researchers who joined ISS21-affiliated projects during 2023, including Dr Tara Kenny and Kirsty Nash both of whom work with Dr Monica O' Mullane on the HIA-IM project; and Caitríona Honohan who joined a research team led by Dr Caitriona Ni Laoire on the *Enabling Diverse Student Voices in UCC* project.

During 2023 we also said goodbye to valued research colleagues and friends from earlier projects, including Dr Felicity Daly and Dr Cliona Loughnane (CareVisions), Dr Reana Maier (IMMERSE) and Dr Robert Bolton (PositivMasc). All have gone on to research and academic roles in Ireland and the UK, and we wish them the very best for the future.

We look forward to hosting Dr Wajeehah Aayeshah as a visiting research fellow during April-June 2024. Dr Aayeshah is a lecturer in Curriculum Design for Arts Teaching Innovation at the University of

Melbourne. Her current project 'kindness in pedagogy' explores kind academic practices, including engaging 'Students as Partners', 'joyful teaching', and creating 'equity-driven academic culture'.
