Every year, ISS21 and its research clusters organise a wide range of events, often in collaboration with projects, schools and departments across the university as well as UCC Futures and community partners. 2025 was no exception. Our programme was broad and varied, spanning seminars and symposiums, conferences, roundtable discussions and film screenings. The following provides a glimpse of the more than 30 events held throughout the year.

## Growing Up in Ireland and TILDA, 26 February and 12 September

ISS21 was delighted to welcome speakers from two major longitudinal studies that contribute to the understanding of ageing and childhood in Ireland. On 26 February, Dr Eoin McNamara, Department of Children, Disability and Equality, presented a workshop on the Growing Up in Ireland study methodology and data set. This event was hosted by the Children and Young People Research Cluster and UCC Futures – Children. In September, Regius Professor Rose Anne Kenny, Trinity College Dublin, shared findings from the Irish Longitudinal Study of Aging (TILDA) at a half day symposium hosted by the ISS21 Ageing Research Cluster and UCC Futures - Ageing and Brain Science. This symposium included presentations from early career researchers and a round table discussion on the shift towards greater public engagement in research.

## The Palestine Exception - public screening and panel discussion, 21 March

Directed by Professor Jan Haaken and Jennifer Ruth, *The Palestine Exception* is a documentary film that features professors and students as they join calls for a ceasefire and take part in anti war protests.

Professor Ursula Kilkelly, Vice President Global Engagement, opened the event and Professor Jan Haaken introduced the documentary. The screening was followed by a panel discussion chaired by Professor Maggie O'Neill, Department of Sociology and Criminology and Director of Collective Social Futures. [Find out more](#)

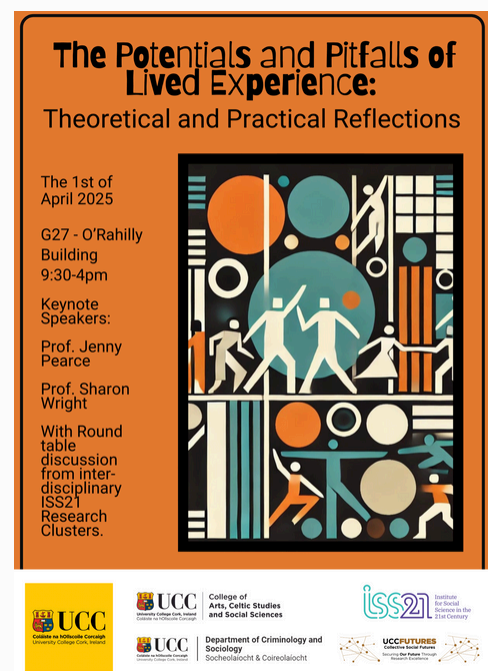
## Marketisation of Care: current and emerging approaches, 4 April

In April, ISS21 research clusters, CARE21 and SHAPE (Society, Health Equity and Political Economy), hosted a timely seminar on the marketisation of care and emerging approaches to care. The seminar included presentations by Professor Julien Mercille (UCD) on unpacking the marketisation of long-term care in Ireland; Dr Claire Edwards (UCC) on the lived experience of care markets; and Dr Carol Power (UCC) on care co-operative approaches to care provision. The seminar was chaired by cluster leaders Dr Monica O'Mullane (SHAPE) and Dr Carol Kelliher (CARE21).

## The Potential and Pitfalls of Lived Experience, 1 April

This full-day symposium critically examined the concept of 'lived experience' from feminist, sociological, criminological, and political perspectives. Highlights included keynote presentations from Professor Jenny Pearce, University of Bedfordshire and Professor Sharon Wright, University of Glasgow.

In round table discussions, colleagues from UCC shared insights on lived experience, based on their own research and practice. The symposium was hosted by several ISS21 research clusters, details available [here](#).



## Migration, Place/making and Belonging Conference, 5-6 June

This two-day interdisciplinary conference brought together scholars and practitioners to discuss the intersections of migration, place/making and belonging in Ireland and beyond. We were delighted to welcome national and international speakers

## **Global & Comparative Perspectives on Gender-Based Violence, 15 October**

This one-day symposium examined different perspectives on gender-based violence, as well as exploring routes to resistance and action, and crafting alternative futures. The keynote address, All Mexican Violence is Gender Violence, was delivered by Professor Pablo Piccato, Columbia University, with opening remarks from Dr Gema Kloppe-Santamaría (Department of Sociology and Criminology, UCC) and a response from Professor Nuala Finnegan (Department of Spanish, Portuguese and Latin American Studies). The symposium was a collaboration between the ISS21 Genders, Sexualities

and Families Research Cluster and colleagues from the College of Arts, Celtic Studies, and Social Sciences. [Find out more.](#)

## **Pedagogical Praxis as a Site of Struggle against Neoliberal Fascisms, 28 November**

This cross-disciplinary 'unconference' event invited participants to reimagine education as a site of resistance and transformation. Key contributors included Professor Jennie Stephens, Maynooth University and Dr Diretnan Dikwal-Bot, UCD, with creative inputs from Wise WaterAcademy and Lydia Cumiskey, BluePrint – MaREI. ## New ISS21 Research Cluster Events

We would especially like to acknowledge the events hosted by ISS21's three new research clusters, which were set up during the 2024/25 academic year. The Populism and Rise of the Far-Right Research Cluster hosted two timely panel discussions in 2025, the first of which was held as part of UCC's Refugee Week. The Crime and Social Harm Research Cluster hosted or co-hosted events that addressed the issues of intimate partner violence and substance abuse, juvenile offending, the use of community sentences or custody, and violence and protection in LGBT+ communities.

Finally, the Work, Organisations and Welfare Research Cluster, in collaboration with several other ISS21 research clusters, took the lead in organising the one-day symposium, The Potential and Pitfalls of Lived Experience - Theoretical & Practical Reflections, (see details on previous pages).

## Other ISS21 Research Cluster events

In addition to events with invited speakers, the ISS21 Research Clusters organise more informal gatherings where members can share their research and research interests. On 19 September, the Disability and Mental Health Research Cluster hosted a [meet and greet event](#) at which colleagues from across UCC shared their research in this field.

In December, the SHAPE research cluster launched a series of Bus Stop Chats, to be held online from December 2025 to May 2026. Inspired by the UCC Bus Stop Chats, these informal lunchtime sessions feature a SHAPE cluster member sharing and discussing their research with an interested, largely nonexpert audience.

## Report Launches

### Enabling Diverse Student Voice in the University

An event was held on 10 January to launch the [Enabling Diverse Student Voice in the University](#) report, which was based on a joint Access UCC and ISS21 project. The launch showcased UCC's Access Student Ambassador Programme as an example of good practice in enabling diverse student voices to be heard in university structures. The event opened with contributions from members of the Access UCC team and Student Ambassadors, followed by a presentation on the project findings and an interactive workshop to explore key questions raised by the research.

### Education First: Lone parents' lived experience of the challenges and benefits of participating in higher education

The report [Education First: Lone parents' lived experience of the challenges and benefits of participating in higher education](#) was launched at an event on 20 October, with contributions from Senator Lynn Ruane and Karen Kiernan, CEO of One Family. Dr Fiona Dukelow, Project PI, presented the key findings. Funded by Research Ireland, the project was carried out by a research team in Applied Social Studies and ISS21 in partnership with One Family.



# ISS21 Projects



There are currently 18 ISS21-affiliated projects, co-hosted with schools and departments across the university. Details of ongoing and completed projects are available on the ISS21 website at [ISS21 Research Projects](#). Several major new projects were initiated in 2025, including:

## **NIGHTWORK FOOTPRINT** - A Synthesis of Contemporary Capitalisms Across Nightshift Cities (2025 – 2029)

NIGHTWORK\_FOOTPRINT is an ambitious new project which explores nightwork and night-time economies in five cities, spanning Ireland, Great Britain, mainland Europe and Canada. With its focus on nightworkers, the project will make an important contribution to an underrepresented area of labour history and urban studies.

## **RED Framework** - Cocreating Rights Enabled by Design (RED) for IoT in Intellectual Disability (2025-2026)

This project explores how The United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities can be integrated into design practices and embedded into

the Internet of Things (IoT), focusing specifically on applications in intellectual disability (ID). The project is an interdisciplinary collaboration between UCC, Queen's University Belfast and community partner, Praxis Care.

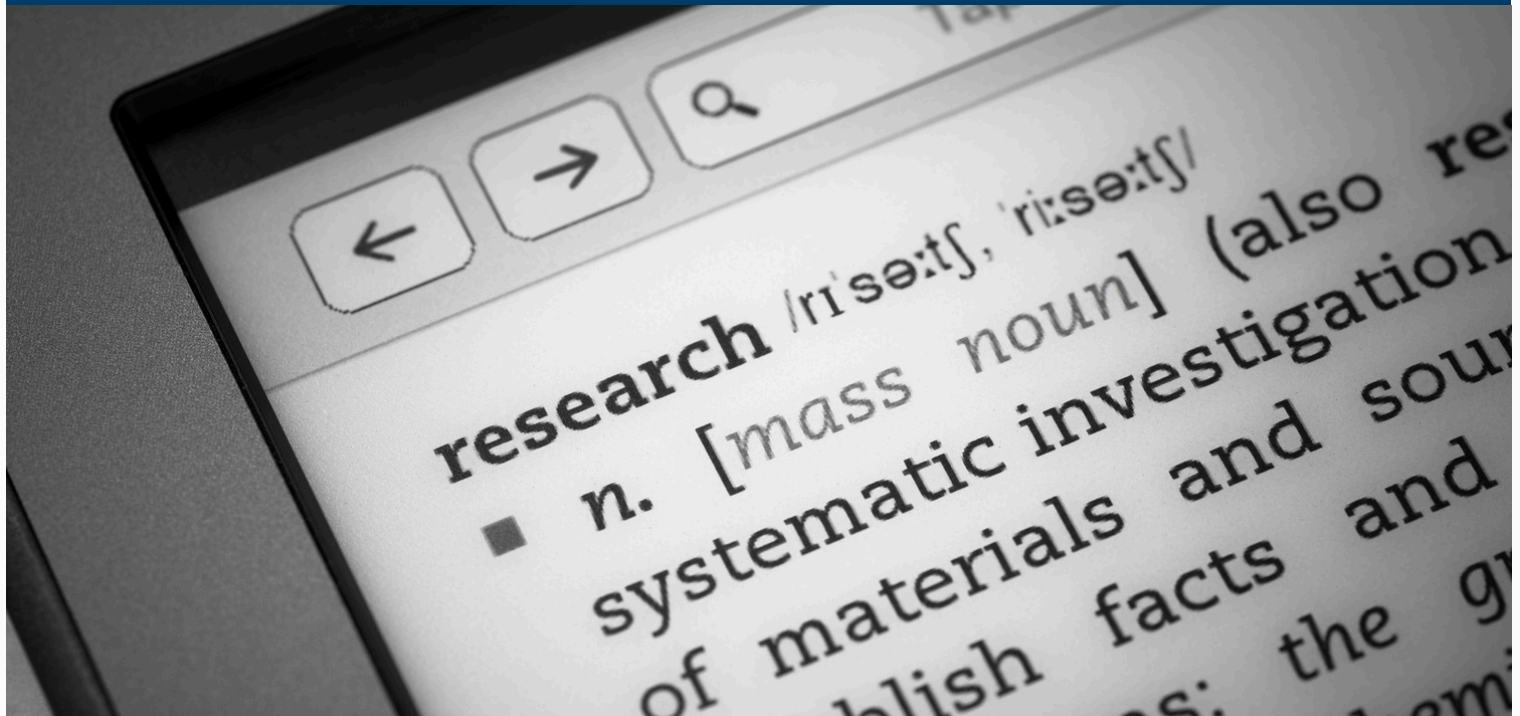
## **MIGDIS** - Migrants' Digital Spaces: technology-assisted analysis of home, border and belonging (2025-2027)

MIGDIS offers an interdisciplinary analysis of how technological advances shape migrants' experiences of home and belonging. The project explores the ways in which migrants negotiate home and place through digital tools and infrastructures.

PI: Dr Mastoureh Fathi (Sociology & Criminology), Co-PI: Dr Paolo Palmieri (School of Computer Science). Funder: Research Ireland COALESCE Programme.

## Starting in 2026

Projects due to begin in 2026 include, **MITIME** - Entanglements of Migration and Time in Post-industrial Urban Europe (2026-2030). Funded by the Horizon Europe MSCA Doctoral Networks programme, MITIME is an interdisciplinary doctoral programme that will train early-career scholars in critical issues of migration, integration and societal change.

## Project Outputs

During 2025, ISS21 researchers continued to disseminate their research through national and international conferences, journal articles, project reports, and other forms of print and broadcast media.

# ISS21 Welcomes new researcher



Adjunct Professor Máiréad Dunne

**Máiréad Dunne is Emeritus Professor of the Sociology of Education at the University of Sussex, a member of the Sussex Consortium for Development Studies (ranked as global No.1 in the field) and a Fellow of the Academy of Social Sciences. She was a visiting scholar at UCC (ISS21) during 2025 and has recently taken up the position of Adjunct Professor at ISS21 and Collective Social Futures. Máiréad was recently interviewed by Ashling O'Sullivan.**

**Ashling:** Máiréad, you spent several months in Cork this year, from February to October, as a Visiting Scholar. Now, in your capacity as Adjunct Professor with ISS21 and CSF, could you share what originally motivated you to engage with UCC?

**Máiréad:** I had a look at the UCC website and came across ISS21 which I thought was very innovative and attractive in terms of the range of research clusters focussed for example on [Genders, Sexualities and Families, Ageing](#) and [Children and Young People](#) among others.

ISS21 appealed to me with its intersectional perspectives that had lots of connections within my own work on sociology, education and international development. I enjoyed my time as a visiting scholar so much that I applied for and have been appointed as an Adjunct Professor and I will be in that post for the next three years.

**Ashling:** During your time as Visiting Scholar, what did you enjoy about being at ISS21 and CSF?

**Máiréad:** I received such a great welcome from the people in UCC. I attended several seminars and workshops. One of my first events was the [Feminist Walk of Cork](#), led by Professor Maggie O'Neill on International Women's Day. That helped me to get to know some of the gender history and geography of Cork. Not only did I have the opportunity to listen to UCC and visiting speakers, but I also enjoyed giving an ISS21 seminar on my own current research work and another to the doctoral students on research processes. I even met one of my previous MA students from the University of Sussex, now a doctoral researcher at UCC!

# CSF Festival of Social Science 2025



**As lead partner in UCC Futures – Collective Social Futures, ISS21 is central to the CSF Festival of Social Science. This year, the third annual festival encompassed several events between 24 and 28 November, with associated events taking place the following week.**

The festival kicked off with a book launch and showcasing event on 24 November. Featured books included: **Walking as Critical Pedagogy** (O'Neill et al 2025), **Being a Researcher** (Frost, 2025), **Climate Change Resilience Across Societal Contexts, Potentials and Visions for the Future** (Skillington and Setti, eds., 2025) and a poetry collection edited by Bahriye Kemal and Giovanna Terzi. The event opened with words of welcome and introduction from Professor John Cryan, Vice President for Research and Innovation and Professor Stephen Graham, Head of the College of Arts, Celtic Studies, and Social Sciences.

That evening at The Shtepps, audiences enjoyed a programme of socially engaged music and spoken word with artists Rosie McCarthy, Oein DeBhairduin, African Queens and Citadel.

This lively event was followed by a full day symposium showcasing social science research across UCC, with a keynote address by Professor Kathleen Lynch, University College Dublin.

Other affiliated events included the Dementia Lifeworlds project symposium and the Women's Experiences of Intimate Partner Violence and Substance Use seminar.
