FOR INCOMING FIRST YEARS AND REPEAT FIRST YEARS 2021/2022

The following regulations apply to all undergraduate programmes within the College of Arts, Celtic Studies and Social Sciences:

Programme Description

• The Programme Description may be found in the University Calendar (<u>https://www.ucc.ie/admin/calendar</u>).

Modules Descriptions/Assessment

• Module Descriptions, including assessment elements and their weightings, are contained in the Book of Modules (<u>www.ucc.ie/modules/</u>).

Marks and credits

- A maximum of 100 marks may be awarded for every five credits of a programme
- Some modules are assessed on a PASS/FAIL basis only i.e. marks are not awarded (www.ucc.ie/modules/).

Credits and Marks Maxima

• A maximum of 60 credits, equating to Total Marks of 1,200, may be awarded unless a module is assessed on a PASS/FAIL basis only. For a full list of credits and marks maxima for all years of all programmes that fall outside of the standard Credits and Marks Maxima structure, see: **Appendix A**.

Pass Standard (module level)

• The pass standard for each module is 40%. Special Requirements for individual modules, if any, are detailed in the Book of Modules (<u>www.ucc.ie/modules/</u>).

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Pass, Pass by Compensation and Progression Standard (Programme level)

FIRST YEAR

To pass First Year and progress to Second Year candidates must:

Appendix I

- (i) achieve an overall mark of 480/1200 across all modules
- (ii) pass at least three subjects (45 credits) with a mark of not less than 40% in each module and in each subject
- (iii) achieve a mark of not less than 30% in each module of the remaining subject (15 credits)

<u>Note</u>: only subjects which are passed with at least 40% in each module in that subject may be continued in second and third year.

OR

Appendix 2

(i) achieve an aggregate mark of at least 480/1200 across all modules

(ii) pass the 30 credit subject with a mark of not less than 40% in each module

(iii) pass at least one other subject with a mark of not less than 40% in each module

(iv) achieve not less than 30% in the remaining subject (15 credits)

Note: only subjects which are passed with at least 40% in each module in that subject may be continued in second and third year.

OR

Appendix 3

(i) Achieve an aggregate mark of at least 480/1200 across all modules

- (ii) Pass modules to the value of at least 50 credits

Single Subject

- 1. achieve an aggregate mark of at least 320/800 in the 40 credit subject and 160/400 in the 20 credit subject.
- 2. pass modules to the value of at least 35 credits in the 40 credit subject and 15 credits in the 20 credit subject.
- 3. achieve a mark of not less than 30% in any remaining module(s).

Appendix 7

Joint Subject

- 1. in each subject, achieve an aggregate mark of at least 240/600 across all modules
- 2. in each subject, pass modules to the value of at least 25 credits.
- 3. achieve a mark of not less than 30% in any remaining module(s).

Appendix 8

<u>Other</u>

Note:

- In First Year, only subjects which are passed with at least 40% in each module in that subject may be continued in second and third year.
- Compulsory modules or modules where distinct elements are required to pass the module overall (Special Requirements), as laid out in the Book of Modules, must be passed to progress to a subsequent year (www.ucc.ie/modules/).

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Undergraduate Certificates and Diplomas – Appendix 9 and Appendix 10

Carry Forward Previous Marks for the Calculation of Final Year Marks /Degree Award (for students entering first year in 2021/2022)

(For students who entered first year prior to 2021/2022 see Appendix 11)

- Programme-based: The aggregate of 33.33% of Year 2 and 66.66% of Year 3 (or 33.33% of Year 3 and 66.66% of Year 4 in a 4-year programme, except where that programme contains a Year Abroad) will be used to calculate the final degree mark, providing that both years have been passed independently.
- Subject-based: The aggregate of 33.33% of each subject in Year 2 and 66.66% of each subject in Year 3 will be used to calculate the final degree mark, providing that both years have been passed independently.
- For those programmes containing a Year Abroad, the marks achieved during that year abroad will not be considered for calculation of the final degree award. The final degree award will be calculated from an aggregate of 33.33% of marks achieved/in each subject in year 2 and 66.66% of marks achieved/in each subject in year 4 (as appropriate), providing both years have been passed independently.
- Note: for BSc (Hons) (Government and Politics) 50% of the Third Year aggregate mark of taught modules (maximum 500 marks) is carried forward and added to the Fourth Year aggregate mark (maximum 1200 marks) to determine the final mark of the BSc (Hons) Government degree.
- Note: for BEd (Hons) (Gaeilge) The grade for the degree is based on a carry-forward of the aggregate marks from First, Second, Third and Fourth Year Examinations.

Calculation of Honours

- Honours are not awarded until the final year
 - Honours are awarded as follows:

0	First Class Honours:	≥70%
0	Second Class Honours, Grade I:	≥60% <i>,</i> <70%
0	Second Class Honours, Grade II:	≥50% <i>,</i> <60%
0	Third Class Honours:	≥45%, <50%
0	Pass:	≥40% <i>,</i> <45%

- **Preponderance** (for those applicable programmes See: **Appendix D**) will be applied as follows:
 - First Class Honours:
 - An aggregate of ≥68% with not less than 70% in modules to the value of at least 30 credits in the final year
 - Second Class Honours, Grade I: ≥60%, <70%
 - An aggregate of ≥58% with not less than 60% in modules to the value of at least 30 credits in the final year
 - Second Class Honours, Grade II: ≥50%, <60%
 - An aggregate of ≥48% with not less than 50% in modules to the value of at least 30 credits in the final year
 - Third Class Honours: ≥45%, <50%

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 An aggregate of ≥43% with not less than 45% in modules to the value of at least 30 credits in the final year

Year Abroad

- In 4-year degrees, in which students spend a year abroad as part of the programme, Year 3 (the Year Abroad) is marked PASS/FAIL, applying standards determined by their host institution with agreement of the relevant academic units in CACSSS. No exemptions are permitted during the Year Abroad.
- Where a programme includes a year spent studying in another University, students will be assessed by their Host University.
- A PASS/FAIL judgement will be presented to the autumn Examination Board.
- Honours are not awarded in the Year Abroad.
- To pass the year abroad and progress to the subsequent year, a candidate must achieve a pass standard as applied by the Host Institution on a set of modules approved by the Host Institution.
- Marks achieved in the Year Abroad will not be considered in the calculation of the final degree award.
- For students failing to achieve a pass mark, there will be a winter Supplemental Examination on equivalent course content and a winter Examination Board, both held in UCC.
- The Supplemental examination assessment type will be prescribed by the appropriate academic unit, (see *Supplemental Examinations* below).
- Note: for BSc (Hons) (Government and Politics): 50% of the Third Year aggregate mark of taught modules (maximum 500 marks) is carried forward and added to the Fourth Year aggregate mark (maximum 1200 marks) to determine the final mark of the BSc (Hons) Government degree.
- The Supplemental Examination Assessment type will be prescribed by the appropriate academic unit; (see *Supplemental Examinations* below).
- Note: for BSc (Hons) (Government and Politics): 50% of the Third Year aggregate mark of taught modules (maximum 500 marks) is carried forward and added to the Fourth Year aggregate mark (maximum 1200 marks) to determine the final mark of the BSc (Hons) Government degree.

Semester Abroad

BEd (Gaeilge):

- Where another language is chosen as the second subject, the first semester (September to November) of Year 3 will be spent entirely in a country where that language is spoken.
- Students are not granted honours and are not ranked in respect of their Semester abroad and can only be granted a PASS/FAIL rating.
- Modules undertaken during the Semester Abroad will be assessed by the Host University

Teaching Council:

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• For teaching purposes, the Teaching Council requires that students of French, German, Irish, Italian, or Spanish must have verifiable residential experience of at least two months in France, Germany, Italy or Spain or a country where French, German, Italian or Spanish is the vernacular (spoken language), or in the case of Irish in an area designated as a Gaeltacht area. In the case of Irish, in order to fulfil this requirement an additional 5 credit module, GA3025 Tréimhse Chónaithe sa Ghaeltacht (5 credits), is available to students taking a programme. The module is taken in addition to the prescribed programme requirements, at no cost to the student. Work towards this module can be undertaken in part in Semester 3 of years 1, 2 or 3 but must be completed in time for the summer or autumn Examination Board in the final year of the programme. All students will register for this module will be recorded on the student transcript. The module will not contribute to the final degree award. Students wishing to take this module should contact the Head of the Department of Modern Irish for further information.

Examination Boards

- Marks for all modules taken in Semester I and II, including those wholly assessed by Continuous Assessment, will be presented to the summer Examination Board. For candidates failing to achieve the pass standard at the summer Examination Board, there will be a Supplemental Examination in autumn with an autumn Examination Board.
- Examination Boards for programmes whose Examination Boards fall outside of this schedule are listed in **Appendix E**.
- *Provisional* marks for Semester 1 examinations are released in February of each year. These marks are subject to approval at the University Examination Board at the end of Semester 2...

Exemptions

- All passed modules carry an exemption, which is limited to a period of 5 academic years (or 2 in the case of Computer Science modules) subsequent to the award of the exemption.
- Where a student fails to achieve the PASS standard required to progress to a subsequent year, they are EXEMPT from further examination in those modules where a PASS mark has been achieved. All failed modules <u>must be taken</u> at supplemental examination.

Supplemental Examinations:

- For students failing to achieve the pass standard at the first attempt, there <u>may</u> be a Supplemental Examination at the next available examination sitting. Please refer to the Book of Modules (<u>www.ucc.ie/modules/</u>) for requirements governing the Supplemental Examination for individual modules. Note: For some modules there is no Supplemental <u>Examination</u>.
- Students who fail to achieve the pass standard for the year at the first attempt must repeat all failed/absent modules at the Supplemental Examination, including those modules where the failing mark previously achieved was greater than the level of compensation (≥30%),

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(where there is provision to do so and if not disallowed by the Examination Board) or in a Repeat Year (see below).

- Marks from all passed modules (40%) are carried forward to the Supplemental Examination Board. The pass/progression rule is then applied to the combination of marks carried forward in passed modules and the (capped see below) marks achieved in repeated modules.
- Students who, in their first year, pass a subject by compensation, can opt to repeat this subject at a Supplemental Examination or in a repeat year if they wish to register for the subject in a subsequent year. Students who achieve the pass standard in a subject at the Supplemental Examination or in a repeat year can register for this subject in subsequent years. Students who do not reach the pass standard in a supplemental examination can use the original result for that subject to progress to a subsequent year but will not be allowed to register for this subject.

Capping of Marks at a Supplemental Examination

• In determining aggregation and progression, the maximum mark that will be taken into account is a pass level (40%). The actual mark achieved by the candidate will be recorded on the student record (Academic Transcript).

Repeat Year Examinations

- Students repeating the year may do so choosing one of the following mechanisms:
 - Students retain exemptions, if any, and must repeat all failed/absent modules including those modules where the failing mark previously achieved was greater than the level of compensation (≥30%). In determining aggregation and progression, full marks achieved in modules passed at the first attempt, plus capped marks achieved in modules at supplemental/Repeat Year Examinations are used.

Note: For students selecting different modules not previously taken, there are no restrictions on the marks awarded for those modules at the first attempt in a repeat year.

2. Students may repeat the year taking the full 60 credits. In determining aggregation and progression, there is no restriction on the marks awarded for modules taken at the first attempt of the Repeat Year. Modules taken at the subsequent Supplemental Examination are capped at the pass mark.

Subject to capacity, all students - whether they have failed or passed – are allowed to choose this option in an attempt to improve their grade.

Where a candidate choosing option 2 also fails the Repeat Year as a result of failing module(s) already passed in the previous year, the aggregation and progression rules as laid out in Option 1 will apply. In the case of candidates choosing option 2 who had already passed at their first attempt year, but who fail the examination in a Repeat Year as a result of failing module(s) already passed in a previous year, the original programme level judgement and associated marks will be awarded.

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• Students repeating the final year are eligible for the award of Honours in the first Repeat Year only. Final Year students wishing to repeat the year with a view to improving their degree result may do so only if they have not been conferred.

Three Year Rule

• Candidates must pass/progress within three academic years of the date of first registration for a year, otherwise they cannot continue in the programme without special permission.
