GENERAL REGULATIONS GOVERNING EXAMINATIONS FOR 2nd – 4th Year UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMMES

Written Examinations:

Written examinations will be held at the end of each Semester. Semester 1 Written Examinations will take place in December (Winter); Semester 2 Written Examinations will take place in April/May (Summer). Written Examinations for programmes with placement will normally take place in March (Spring). Written Examinations for Semester 3 will take place in July/August (Autumn).

Publication of Results:

Dates of issue of results for all programmes are found on the SREO web page http://www.ucc.ie/en/exams/

Provisional Semester 1 module marks are released centrally by SREO on specified, advertised, dates. These marks are subject to approval by the External Examiners, University Examination Boards and Academic Board and remain provisional until ratified at the end of the academic year.

Awarding of Credits:

Where a student passes the year according to the Pass and Progression Rules he/she shall be awarded 60 credits. Students who fail a module(s) but satisfy the Pass and Progression Rules will be awarded 60 credits and the judgement recorded for failed module(s) will be Pass by Compensation.

Absence from an Examination in a Module:

Registration at the beginning of an academic year constitutes entry for Examination. All repeat students are required to present for examination in the relevant subject(s)/module(s).

A student who is prevented for medical reasons or other personal circumstances from attending all or part of the Examination, and who has not withdrawn from the programme, should submit to apply the Student Records and Examinations to defer https://www.ucc.ie/en/exams/procedures-regulations/

Applications for a deferral of all examinations to supplemental (Autumn) or repeat year examinations are considered before the start of written examinations. Only in exceptional circumstances will a partial deferral be considered. Complete applications requesting Deferral of examinations must be submitted **no later than two weeks before** the official start date of examinations.

Students registered with the Disability Support Service (DSS) should contact their Disability Advisor in the first instance, to discuss Deferral of Examinations. The Disability Support Service may be contacted at: 021 4904848, disabilitysupport@ucc.ie, or by calling to Room 1.43, Access and Participation, First Floor, The Hub, Main campus.

Students who are pregnant or who have had a baby within close proximity to the examinations will be automatically granted a deferral by submitting a completed Mitigation form (https://www.ucc.ie/en/exams/procedures-regulations/). Appropriate supporting documentation must be included.

Where a student fails to present for an End of Semester Examination(s) Written Examination in a module, a judgement of "Absent" is recorded for that module. "Absent" is counted as an attempt at an examination. Where a module is examined by a combination of Continuous Assessment and End of Year Written Examination, and the student does not present for the End of Year Written Examination, an "Absent" judgement and the mark for Continuous Assessment are recorded. Where a module is assessed wholly by Continuous Assessment, and the student presents no work, a "Presented No Work" judgement is recorded.

Supplemental Examinations:

Supplemental Examinations for Semester 1 and 2 will be held in July/August (Autumn). Supplemental Examinations for Semester 3 will be held in December (Winter). Please refer to the Book of Modules (www.ucc.ie/academic/modules/) for requirements governing the Supplemental Examination for individual modules. Note: for some modules there is no Supplemental Examination.

A student who fails his/her End of Semester Examination(s), or who fails to present, will be automatically entered for the Autumn Supplemental Examination unless debarred by the Examination Board. Students not so debarred must inform the Student Records and Examinations Office, in writing, prior to the start of the exam period if they do not intend sitting the Autumn Supplemental Examination. Where a student fails to inform the Student Records and Examinations Office of his/her intention not to sit the Autumn Supplemental Examination, a judgement of "Absent" is recorded for module(s). "Absent" is counted as an attempt at an examination.

Repeat Year Arrangements:


Students repeating the year will repeat under the current regulations.

Application for Waiver of Capping of Marks:

The requirement for the capping of marks awarded for a module at a Supplemental Examination or, where applicable, Repeat Year Examination may be waived under certain specified circumstances. General regulations governing examinations for all programmes can be found on the web at: http://www.ucc.ie/en/exams/procedures-regulations/

Optional Additional Modules (Fee applies):

Students may take up to 10 additional credits in addition to their 60 core credits. Please note that the fee for taking every 5 additional credits will be 1/12th of the full year tuition fee for the programme. Such optional additional modules will not be considered in determining pass and progression, nor in determining the student's examination grade. However, marks achieved in these modules will appear in the student's transcript.

For students failing to achieve the pass standard for the year at the Summer Examination Board, there will be a Supplemental Examination in Autumn (and/or supplemental year's work as appropriate) with an Autumn Examination Board.

Pass Standard (module level):	The pass standard for each module is 40%. Special Requirements for individual modules, if any, are detailed in the <i>Book of Modules</i> http://www.ucc.ie/modules/
Pass and Progression Standard (programme level):	To pass Second Year and progress to Third Year a candidate must: (i) obtain an aggregate mark of at least 40% (480/1200 marks) across all modules; (ii) pass modules to the value of at least 50 credits; (iii) obtain a mark of not less than 30% in any remaining module(s).
Honours:	Students are eligible for the award of honours on the aggregate mark for the year over the Summer Examination Board and Autumn Supplemental Examination Board.
	 First Class: an aggregate of at least 840/1200 marks (70% and above) or an aggregate of at least 816 marks with at least half of the credits attained with marks of 70% or above. Second Class, Grade I: an aggregate of at least 720/1200 marks (60% and above but less than 70%) or an aggregate of at least 696 marks with at least half of the credits attained with marks of 60% or above. Second Class, Grade II: an aggregate of at least 600/1200 marks (50% and above but less than 60%) or an aggregate of at least 576 marks with at least half of the credits attained with marks of 50% or above. Third Class: an aggregate of at least 540/1200 marks (45% and above but less than 50%) or an aggregate of at least 516 marks with at least half of the credits attained with marks of 45% or above.
	The mark in the BA (Hons) Economics (through Transformational Learning) is the combination of the aggregate marks obtained in the Second year and the third year BA (through Transformational Learning) Examinations, in the following proportions, provided that both years have been passed independently: Second BA (Hons) Economics (through Transformational Learning) 33 1/3% (i.e. 1/3 of 1200 marks), BA Hons Economics (through Transformational Learning) 66 2/3% (i.e. 2/3 of 1200 marks).
Exemptions:	All passed modules carry an exemption, which is limited to a period of 5 academic years subsequent to the award of the exemption.

Supplemental Examinations:

Supplemental Examinations for Semesters 1 and 2 will be held in August (Autumn).

Please refer to the Book of Modules for requirements governing the Autumn Supplemental Examination for individual modules. Note: For some modules there is no Supplemental Examination.

Students who fail to achieve the pass standard for the year at the Summer Examination Board must repeat all failed/absent modules at the Supplemental Examination Board, where there is provision to do so and if not disallowed by the Examination Board, or in a Repeat Year (see below). Marks from all passed modules are carried forward to the Supplemental Examination.

The pass/progression rules are applied to the combination of marks carried forward in passed modules and marks obtained in repeated modules.

Capping of Marks at a Supplemental Examination: In determining aggregation and progression, the maximum mark that will be taken into account is a pass (40%). The actual mark achieved by the candidate will be recorded on the student record.

Repeat Year Examinations:

Students repeating the year may do so choosing whichever of the two following mechanisms best suits his/her requirements. *Note: Students are eligible for the award of Honours in the first Repeat Year only.*

- 1. Students retain exemptions, if any, and must repeat all failed/absent modules. In determining aggregation, progression, and the calculation of the award of honours, full marks obtained in modules passed at the Summer Examination Board in the first attempt year plus capped marks obtained in modules in Supplemental and Repeat Year Examinations are used. Note: For students selecting different modules not previously taken, there are no restrictions on the marks awarded for those modules at the Summer Examination Board of a Repeat Year.
- 2. Students may repeat the year taking the full 60 credits. In determining aggregation, progression, and the calculation of the award of honours, there is no restriction on the marks awarded for modules at the Summer Examination Board of the Repeat Year. Modules taken at the subsequent Supplemental Examination are capped at the pass mark. Subject to capacity, all students, whether they have failed or passed, are allowed to choose this option in an attempt to improve their grade.

In the case of a candidate choosing option 2 who failed the first attempt year and who also fails a Repeat Year as a result of failing module(s) already passed a previous year, a pass for the year will be awarded by the Examination Board, provided the student achieves the Pass and Progression Standard for the year on the combined results from both years.

In the case of candidates choosing option 2 who had already passed or got honours in their first attempt year but who (i) fail the examination in a Repeat Year as a result of failing module(s) already passed in a previous year or (ii) fail to qualify for a higher class of honours at the second attempt, the original programme level judgement and associated marks will be awarded by the Examination Board.

Three Year Rule:

Candidates must pass/progress within 3 academic years of the date of first registration for Second Year, otherwise they cannot continue in the programme.

This year is spent studying in a university abroad. Students will be assessed by their host university. A pass/fail judgement for the Year Abroad will be forwarded to the Autumn Examination Time: Board. For students failing to achieve the pass mark there will be a Winter Supplemental Examination with marks going to the Winter Examination Board. To pass Third Year and progress to Fourth Year a candidate must achieve a pass standard as Pass and Progression applied by the Host Institution on a set of modules approved by the Programme Directors. Standard (programme level): Honours are not awarded in the Year Abroad. **Honours: Supplemental** Students who fail at the Autumn Examination Board will be required to complete **Examinations:** supplemental assessment as proscribed by the Programme Director(s). In determining aggregation and progression, the maximum mark that will be taken into account is a pass Candidates must pass within 3 academic years of the date of first registration for Third Year, Three Year Rule: otherwise they cannot continue in the programme.

Pass Standard (Module Level):	The pass standard for each module is 40%. Special Requirements for individual modules, if any, are detailed in the Book of Modules https://www.ucc.ie/admin/registrar/modules/
Pass and Progression Standard (programme level):	To pass Third Year and progress to Fourth Year a candidate must: (i) obtain an aggregate mark of 40% (240/600 marks) across all modules, excluding EC3164 and EC3165; (ii) obtain a pass in each module in modules to the value of at least 25 credits; (iii) obtain a mark of not less than 30% in any remaining module. The Work Placement module EC3164 and the Economics Research Project module EC3165 will contribute to the final degree result on a Pass/Fail basis and must be passed to qualify for an Honours grade in the degree. Note: EC3164 and EC3165 cannot be repeated and students who fail either module will only be eligible for a Pass grade in the BA (Hons) Economics (through Transformational Learning) Degree.
Honours:	Honours are awarded on the aggregate of the marks for the taught modules only as follows: First Class: an aggregate of at least 420/600 marks (70% and above) or an aggregate of at least 408 marks with at least half of the credits attained with marks of 70% or above. Second Class Grade 1: an aggregate of at least 360/600 marks (60% and above but less than 70%) or an aggregate of at least 348 marks with at least half of the credits attained with marks of 60% or above. Second Class Grade 2: an aggregate of at least 300/600 marks (50% and above but less than 60%) or an aggregate of at least 288 marks with at least half of the credits attained with marks of 50% or above.

Third Class: an aggregate of at least 270/600 marks (45% and above but less than 50%) or an aggregate of at least 258 marks with at least half of the credits attained with marks of 45% or above. For the regulations governing the award of Honours in a Repeat Year, see below. **Exemptions:** All passed modules carry an exemption, which is limited to a period of 5 academic years subsequent to the award of the exemption. **Supplemental** Supplemental Examinations for Semester 1 will be held in August (Autumn). the Book of Modules(www.ucc.ie/academic/modules) for requirements governing the Supplemental Examination for individual modules.

Note: There is no Supplemental Examination for EC3164 and EC3165; these modules cannot be repeated.

Students who fail to achieve the pass standard for the year at the Summer Examination Board must repeat all failed/absent modules at the Supplemental Examination, where there is provision to do so and if not disallowed by the Examination Board, or in a Repeat Year (see below). Marks from all passed modules are carried forward to the Supplemental Examination.

The pass/progression rule is then applied to the combination of marks carried forward in passed modules and marks obtained in repeated modules.

Capping of Marks at a Supplemental Examination: In determining aggregation, progression, and the calculation of honours, the maximum mark that will be taken into account is a pass (40%). The actual mark achieved by the candidate will be recorded on the student record.

Repeat Year **Examinations:**

Students repeating the year may do so under one of the following mechanisms, individual repeat candidates choosing whichever mechanism best suits his/her requirements. Note: Students are eligible for the award of Honours in the first Repeat Year only.

1. Students retain exemptions, if any, and must repeat all failed/absent modules. Note: The Work Placement module (i.e. EC3164) and the Economics Research Report module (i.e. EC3165) cannot be repeated. In determining aggregation, progression, and the calculation of the award of honours, full marks obtained in modules passed at the Summer Examination Board in the first attempt year plus capped marks obtained in modules in Supplemental and Repeat Year Examinations are used.

Note: For students selecting different modules not previously taken, there are no restrictions on the marks awarded for those modules at the Summer Examination of a Repeat Year.

2. Students may repeat the year taking the full 30 credits – the Work Placement module (i.e. EC3164) and the Economics Research Report module (i.e. EC3165) cannot be repeated. In determining aggregation, progression, and the calculation of the award of honours, there is no restriction on the marks awarded for modules at the Summer Examination Board of the Repeat Year. Modules taken at the subsequent Supplemental Examination are capped at the pass mark. Subject to capacity, all students, whether they have failed or passed, are allowed to choose this option in an attempt to improve their grade.

In the case of a candidate choosing option 2 who failed the first attempt year and who also fails a Repeat Year as a result of failing a module(s) already passed in a previous year, a pass for the year will be awarded by the Examination Board, provided

	the student achieves the Pass and Progression Standard for the year on the combined results from both years.

Candidates must obtain a pass of 40% in the Practice-Based Research Project (FE6308). On the recommendation of the Department of Food Business & Development, an examination board may decide that a Practice-Based Research Project is a borderline pass/fail and may agree to permit the student to make minor corrections to achieve the pass standard for the Practice-Based Research Project within six weeks of the publication of examination results. Repeat Year Examinations: Students retain exemptions, if any, and must repeat all failed/absent modules. In determining aggregation, progression, and the calculation of the award of honours, full marks obtained in modules passed at the Summer Examination in the first attempt year plus capped
