This project was begun by the late Michael Holland, University Curator, Heritage Services, Buildings & Estates, UCC. Beginning with the War Record of UCC, published in 1919, which was not completely accurate, he and research assistant Fiona Devoy [now Dr Fiona Devoy McAuliffe] built on this and added further information and details from Dec 2010-Jun 2012. Michael continued the research until Autumn 2018 when his illness prevented further work. This data has now been input into a database. Since 2021 the work has continued to improve the information about those alumni who served in World War One (as well as other historic alumni since 1849). 'Alumni' includes graduates and those who studied at Cork.




