


WHAT CAN ART HISTORY GRADUATES OFFER EMPLOYERS?

- A knowledge of research portals, from archives to online sources, that demands a range of analytical and assessment skills to interpret data.








GRADUATE OUTCOMES FOR ART HISTORY STUDENTS

Our graduates thrive in careers that mobilize their writing, analytical, organisational and collaborative skills, including jobs in education, curation, publicity, management, and design. Students from UCC work locally, nationally, and internationally in diverse, challenging jobs that make a difference in both the private and public sectors.







GRADUATE STUDIES

Graduate study in art history trains students to work in high level public and commercial contexts from university education and research to museum professions. UCC offers a range of postgraduate options from Masters to PhD, including two taught Masters degrees in History/Theory/Criticism and Global Gallery Studies. These one-year programmes are designed to prepare students for competitive professional careers in the arts and education sectors, with practical training and work placements as well as cutting-edge theoretical models. Students interested in contributing to scholarly and museum research can embark on supervised independent study in MPhil and PhD programmes.

AREAS OF EMPLOYMENT FOR ART HISTORY GRADUATES



Graduates in the History of Art leave with strong communication, analytical, and contextual skills, geared to contributing to a variety of commercial and non-profit sectors including the cultural industry, the media sector, museums and galleries, auction houses, education, law, and journalism. Our students have developed national and international careers in the following arenas as:

Public Education Coordinators, Lecturers, and Invigilators in national and international institutions, including local galleries and museums in Cork, the National Gallery of Ireland, and the Irish Pavilion at the Venice Biennale. Their job is to develop interactive educational programmes for a range of audiences and facilitate public access and understanding of collections.



Directors and Managers of Museums and Galleries, including the Hayward Gallery in London and the Queensland College of Art, Brisbane, who oversee all aspects of operation, installation, and outreach.

Senior Writers and Publicists for Auction Houses, ranging from national organizations such as Adams Auction House (Dublin) or international institutions such as Christie's and Sotheby's, with locations in Europe, Asia, and the Middle East.

Graduate Profile 1 KATINKA WENDT


While an Erasmus student at UCC during my BA degree, I stumbled upon the MA Modern and Contemporary Art History, Theory and Criticism, which I found

Visit art exhibitions weekly.




Attend public museum and gallery talks to expand your knowledge.




Write critical reviews of exhibitions and submit your work for publication in local, national, and international art journals.


















Think outside the box: be creative and foster new networks and collaborations with industry.
