INTRODUCTIONS

Introductions

A clear and concise introduction serves as a roadmap for your reader. It should state your primary argument or position on a topic, and then outline the main points you will discuss as you justify your position throughout the main body. Take your time when deciding how to word your introduction, and remember that your introduction:

- Is **the first thing your reader will see** make sure the first impression is a good one!
- **Grab the reader's attention** this will make them interested to read more.
- Always clearly introduce your topic and explain what your essay will be about.
- Should **sound authoritative** you should know what you are talking about!
- Communicate the **relevance of your assignment** persuade the reader of the importance of your paper and the reason why they should want to keep reading.

What to include in an introduction?

- ✓ Use some relevant background information/ context to give the reader an idea of your focus and argument.
- ✓ Provide a **clear thesis statement** which states your interpretation of the material.
- ✓ Give an **overview of the structure** of your essay (don't just list these things!)
- ✓ Signpost for the reader where you are going without directly stating each step.
- Comment on what is to come or sketch it out don't leave the reader guessing as to what your point is.
- **✓** Present your point of view and make a brief introductory argument for it.

Q TOP TIP

Introductions may also provide some background information or context to give the reader an idea of the focus of your paper. However, you must ensure that this background information is relevant to your assignment.



What to avoid in an introduction?

- \times Do <u>not</u> repeat the essay title or question in the introduction.
- X Do <u>not</u> use vaque/irrelevant statements
- X Avoid repetition of specific words/phrases.
- X Stay clear of clichés.
- Do not go into unnecessary detail regarding your key arguments at this point
 touch on them briefly and save the detail for the main body.
